



Large Shipment of Steel Coming For New Bridge

Southern Pacific Will Handle 40,000 Tons of Heavy Material

First shipments of the largest steel order ever routed across the country by rail have started from Pittsburgh, destined for the San Francisco-Oakland bridge, according to word received here by Southern Pacific Company, over whose lines the material will reach Oakland.

More than 40,000 tons are to be handled by rail and approximately 1000 cars will be required for the total movement which will extend over nine months, it was stated here by A. I. Moran, district freight agent, Southern Pacific Company.

Many of the heavy pieces are of such size and weight that two cars will be used to support them on the long journey. The largest are 65 feet long, over 12 feet wide and weigh 75 tons, railroad officials have been advised. No difficulty is anticipated in handling the steel, however, as modern car and locomotive equipment is more than sufficient for such loads.

Upon reaching Southern Pacific's Oakland yards, the steel will be stored in the open for at least three months for "weather curing," it was stated. It then will be delivered to the job as needed.

McMullen Gets Probation On Federal Charge

Restitution of Misapplied Funds Included in Terms of Probation

Frank W. McMullen, former manager of the Lomita branch of the California Bank, was placed under five years probation Monday when he appeared for sentence in the United States district court by Judge Harry Hollzer. McMullen had previously pleaded guilty to a charge of misapplication of the bank's funds and had asked for probation.

Under the terms decreed by Judge Hollzer, McMullen will be under the surveillance of a federal probation officer for five years. He will make arrangements with this officer for restitution of the \$125 which he admitted obtaining illegally from the bank.

McMullen was originally to have appeared for sentence January 22 but more time was granted for the probation officer to study the case.

He was indicted on these charges after he had been released at the local bank and the United States attorney's office had "taken over" the books of the bank thoroughly.

Mexican Ranch Hand Pleads Guilty to Charge of Murder

Magdalena Quijas, Mexican, plead guilty to second degree murder in superior court last week and received a sentence of from five years to life in the penitentiary, pronounced by Judge Frank Smith before whom the trial was to be heard.

Quijas was charged with the killing of his wife, Carmen, 20 years old, at their home in Wilmington, on June 25, 1932. After more than a year Quijas was arrested. He had police officers to the unmarked grave of his wife, whom he had buried in a strawberry field on the Weston ranch in South Torrance.

Court Ruling In Liquor Cases Is Adverse to Assn.

Liquor Dealers Lose Fight to Obtain Permanent Injunction

The fight begun by the Los Angeles Liquor Dealers Association to prevent drug stores in this city and throughout Los Angeles county from selling packaged liquor if they operate soda or lunch counters has been given a set-back according to a ruling on file today in Los Angeles county superior court by Judge Emmett Wilson. The ruling states that the superior court has no power to restrain such sales.

The Liquor Dealers Association had filed an order to show cause why a permanent injunction restraining such sales should not be issued. The association claimed that such sales were in violation of state legislation. The board of equalization was also named defendant in the action and the plaintiffs asked that it be prohibited from issuing any more "off-sale" liquor licenses to such stores.

The drug companies named were the Owl Drug Company, Thrifty Drug Stores, Smile Drug Stores, Penny Drug Stores and Sontag Drug Stores.
