

Examinations For Civil Service Jobs California, Nevada

The United States civil service commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions of blaster, foreman, forestry improvement, foreman, bridge and tower construction, and pneumatic drill operator to fill existing and future vacancies in U. S. Forest Service, and future vacancies in other government services throughout the state of California, and in the Mono National forest, with headquarters at Minden, Nevada.

The entrance salaries are as follows: Blaster, \$1.10 an hour; foreman, forestry improvement, \$2.00 a year; foreman, bridge and tower construction, \$2.90 a year; operator, trailblazer, \$1.10 an hour; pneumatic drill operator, \$1.10 an hour. These salaries are subject to a deduction of 15 per cent as a measure of economy, and 3 1/2% toward a retirement annuity.

Application forms and information as to requirements may be obtained from the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at Alturas, Bakersfield, Bishop, Chico, El Centro, Eureka, Fresno, Los Angeles, Red Bluff, Riverside, Sacramento, San Diego, San Jose, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, Santa Rosa, Stockton and Vallejo, California; or from the Forest Supervisor, Mono National forest, Minden, Nevada; or from the Manager, 12th U. S. Civil Service District, Room 241 Post Office Building, San Francisco, California.

Applications must be filed in complete form in the office of the district manager at San Francisco, California, not later than the hour of closing business on March 9, 1934.

Garden Plots Are Located In Fourth District

Aggregate of 80 Acres Now Available to Dependent Families

Supervisor John R. Quinn today announced location of four county community garden plots in the fourth district aggregating 80 acres, sufficient to provide fifth of an acre tracts for 400 families now totally dependent upon the county. The fourth district tracts are as follows:

Compton, 20 acres at Long Beach boulevard and Olive street.

Long Beach, 20 acres at Pine avenue and Willow street.

Santa Monica, 20 acres at 26th and Pearl streets.


Wilmington, 20 acres at Sanford and East L. street.

More tracts will be located later, Supervisor Quinn announced. It is the plan of the county to cultivate 2000 acres which will provide plots for 10,000 families. The county will pay for plowing, seed, water, equipment and supervision. Land is donated by owners and in many cases water is furnished free or at cost.

To launch the program the supervisors have appropriated \$10,000 and have agreed to appropriate more if it is needed. A test on 157 acres last year showed that families on fifth of an acre tracts produced for many vegetables as are contained in the county's average monthly food allowance, and at a third of the cost.

Passage of Duck Stamp Bill Urged By Local Hunters

Torrance sportsmen are taking an interest in the proposed "Duck Stamp Bill" which is before Congress, by writing to California members of that body to use their influence and vote for the passage of the measure. Letters written to Congressman Charles J. Golden and Senator Hiram Johnson this week bore the signatures of B. J. Scott, A. H. Laursen, Alfred Gouder, A. L. Bond, Fred E. Neal, L. B. Kelsey, Walter E. Schlick, W. H. Stanger, Grover C. Whyte and others. The Duck Stamp bill provides for a federal license for hunters and fishermen at \$1.00, the proceeds of which will go to the protection of wild game and the establishment of natural breeding and rest areas. Support of the federal project would entail no expense to taxpayers other than sportsmen.

Seniors Nose Out Juniors By One Point In Annual Preliminary

Close competition between the seniors and juniors at the annual inter-class track meet held at the Torrance high school furnished plenty of entertainment to the spectators Friday afternoon. The seniors won the meet by the small margin of one point, rolling up 57, juniors 56, sophomores 14 and freshmen 7.

Suni Ishikawa lead the seniors to victory by contributing 1834 points. Sumi won the pole vault, low hurdles, broad jump and finished second in the 100-yard dash. He topped off this all-round performance by running a lap in the relay.

"Iron Man" Louis Zamperini won his 21st consecutive victory by placing first in the 1200, with LaVerne Jones following him like his shadow.

Bob Wertz brought renown to the juniors by tying the school record in the 100, and Hubert Luek, also a junior, won the 410 in a spectacular finish.

Many new track prospects who give promise of being valuable to the regular team were uncovered in this contest and the chances are that Torrance high will place well up in the West Marine League series which begins on March 9. On that date Torrance will meet El Segundo and North Long Beach in a triangular meet held on the local field.
