Question: What is the best kind of tinted lens to use for glare caused by excessive light. Answer: A lens that has uniform transmission, known as absorption and is free from striae. In other words, you want a lens that is ground so that you can be sure of what it is doing to your eye. Made of glass with a known formula (not just tinted) so that you will have adequate vision, one that can be duplicated in its action, with a chemical mixture in the glass that absorbs (or shuts out) glare. There are several kinds of inexpensive lenses of this character. Anyone who will take the time to investigate will be pleasantly surprised to find what a difference there is in properly made tinted lenses and common, colored glass.
