

Initiation will be held in the Greek Theatre, Griffith Park, Saturday, June 15, at 4 o'clock. Admission is by ticket. The orator of the day will be Richard Halliburton, author.

Scholarship Competition Date Extended

Bank of America Sets June 22 as New Date for Closing Contest

Closing date for entries in Bank of America's \$10,000 scholarship competition has been deferred to June 22, and essays submitted by that date will be eligible for consideration by the judges, it was announced today.

The change in the closing date was instituted in order to avoid conflict with the closing of the California schools for the summer vacation, bank officials said.

The bank is offering 11 scholarships and cash awards for the best essays on the subject of "The World of 1964." Two primary awards of \$2000 scholarships, for which the two winners can qualify scholastically, are offered.

Judges in the competition are Presidents Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California, Ray Lyman Wilbur of Stanford and Rufus B. von Kleinsmid of University of Southern California.

Candidates in the scholarship competition are limited in age to 18 years or under. Essays are restricted to 1000 words. The writers, whose age indicates their opportunity to become the leaders of tomorrow, may write in general on life in 1964, or may take up any particular phase of human activity in which they are interested: Science, agriculture, art, business, medicine or the law for example.

Halfway Mark In SERA Labor Quota Passed This Week

The SERA passed the half-way mark in its labor quota of 25,000 workers at the beginning of this week, with additional men and women being put to work at the rate of approximately 500 per day. Projects in operation throughout the county totalled 107.

On Monday, 12,500 work orders had been issued from the 25 district offices of the work relief organization. Torrance district office issued 409 of this number. The tentative quota of 25,000 for this county is based upon the budget of approximately \$3,500,000 for the state, granted each month by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration.
