

Paris Styles

PARIS (U.P.)—Turn your eye toward the trees and watch the leaves as they begin to turn and fall, if you would know the colors of your winter wardrobe.

As the days pass the shades of brown and green, yellow and red will deepen into the rich, natural tones of bark and leaf and delightfully to Lesur who has been making a careful study of forests and the inspiration they offer to fashion.

The only colors he weaves into these basic browns and greens and yellows are deep forest shadows of violet, gray and glowing reds. He makes wool with metal—violet—which has a twist of wool on a metal warp lacquered and forming lustrous of glow-worms, and a thicker fabric with a mossy surface called "Stracklack."

He does a family of woollens with cellulose; "Sed," a lightweight material for dresses; "Lined," a woolen strewn with threads of cellulose in fine small and "Logwood," very supple wool with medium squares of cellulose.

His lace wools feature square meshes covered with designs of many colored embroidery, twisted yarn, etc. "Eel" has spots of a darker shade superimposed to form an eel-like, and is used for dresses; "Azrot" is a grainy lace, soft as satin with lustrous red rabbit hairs sprinkled through it.

Variety in these lace wools seems limitless.
