Some of the most interesting places she will visit on her trip are Balboa (the first stop), Santiago, Lima, the Straits of Magellan, Puntas Arenas which is the most southern city in the world, Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro. Miss Mason will return November 19.

Sample Ballots Mailed Out For Special School Election Sept. 27

Delivery of 881,000 sample ballots for the special Los Angeles city school district election September 27 was begun this week by the postoffice department, and was scheduled for completion before Thursday. In San Fernando, Beverly Hills, Torrance, Lynwood, Bell and other municipalities served by the Los Angeles district the only question on the ballot will be the recall of three members of the Los Angeles board of education.

In North Hollywood, Pacoima and other sections of Los Angeles proper there also will be 26 proposed charter amendments and an initiative measure providing for Sunday dancing throughout the city. Precincts have been consolidated for the election, at least two in one as a general rule throughout the area affected. There will be a total of 815 precincts, of which 155 are in municipalities outside Los Angeles, but served by the Los Angeles city school system. Those inside Los Angeles total 660. EVENING HIGH SCHOOL

The Torrance evening high school opened last Monday evening with an initial enrollment of 81. This number was very satisfactory but it is hoped that many more will come to take advantage of the opportunities offered. Those in charge of the school are very anxious to make the school contribute the most possible to the community. To this end they invite every one to come to the office with their suggestions whereby the school may increase its service to the people. Every effort will be made to supply new teachers for any class where there is a sufficient demand. As usual the largest enrollment was in the commercial department. "We are fortunate this year," says Principal Guy L. Mowrey, "in having a young man from Inglewood who is well trained in all of the commercial subjects. Mr. Andrus is a fine man to meet, and I know everyone will enjoy working with him."

The return of Miss Herdman from the clothing and millinery of Mr. Fliske for Spanish, Mr. Walters for English and Mr. Isen for commercial law and Miss Boecher for arts and crafts, insure that all who enroll in their classes, that they will receive the best of training in that class. Last year classes in mathematics and Spanish were held concurrently but this year there will be a separate class for each. Mr. Lawyer, who has been assigned the mathematics, is a young man, splendidly trained and anxious to help everyone with their mathematical needs. Principal Mowrey has delayed asking for a leader of the forum group until he is assured of a sufficient group to make the class interesting.

The men's physical training under civic center started off with a nice group under the leadership of Mr. Heap. The facilities will not be as good as last year until the other buildings have been rehabilitated. However, a very good program has been outlined for those who come. Organization of the Diesel engine and Americanization classes has been disappointing because teachers selected failed to qualify for their work and therefore could not be appointed. It is believed that the matter will be straightened out by the first of next week so that the classes may go on with their work. Five people have asked for a class in beauty culture. If ten more will signify their interest in that work a teacher will be assigned.
