Miss Vera Menchik, the woman world champion, has just put up her cover by winning first prize in a recent Master tournament at Maribor, Yugoslavia. She was the only woman contestant and opposed many of the strong continental masters, among whom were such notables as V. Pirc, Lajos Steiner, R. Spielmann, Dr. Astalos, M. Vidmar and Dr. Drezdz.

The winter chess "season" is really opening with a loud bang. Vigorous activity and a wealth of coming events are announced from every section of the civilized world. Even at our own doorstep we hear of considerable increase in interest of the royal pastime among those who formerly considered the game beneath or beyond them, or who had no time to waste on it.

A score of more or new clubs have recently sprung into existence in Southern California. Last Tuesday evening a little band of a dozen enthusiasts opened new club rooms in the old armory-building in San Pedro.

Tournaments to determine Southern California championships are now under way in Los Angeles. The inter-club matches are due to start next month in which all Southern California clubs having teams of Class "A" players compete.

In January I. Kashdan, young American master, is to contest Frank Marshall for the United States championship. Early next year Dr. Euwe, the Holland grand master, will contest Dr. Alekhine for the world championship.

Dr. Euwe is now being challenged by Lillenthal, the young Hungarian master, in a short match. Next Christmas the International Chess Congress is to be held at Melbourne, Australia. Dr. Alekhine, the world champion, plans to visit Melbourne on his second world tour, to participate in the congress. Plans are now formulating for a huge tournament in New York to select the members of the American team to go to Warsaw next year.

Indian Burial Exhibited MARSHFIELD, Ore. (I.P.)—A complete Indian burial exhibit was a part of display shown at the Paul Bunyan celebration here. This included a complete skeleton, surrounded with trinkets, stone and bone relics, horn, and shell work.

Conqueror Of Mt. Everest Will Lecture

The only man to fly over Mt. Everest, Air Commodore P. F. M. Fellowes, D. S. O., will arrive in Los Angeles on October 16 for a public lecture under the auspices of the Pacific Geographic Society at Wilshire-Ebuhl Theatre.

Fellowes was in charge of airship development for his government from 1924 to 1929, following a brilliant war record where he won the Distinguished Service Order for bravery on the Flanders front. For several years he served as aide-de-camp to H. M. King George V. Then which plans were complete for the aerial conquest of Mt. Everest, in the spring of 1933, England sent the commodore to Nepal, in the Himalayas, to assume command of the expedition. In April of that year he directed the now famous flight which conquered the world's highest peak at 30,000 feet.

This will be Air Commodore Fellowes' first trip to the coast and he brings with him motion pictures of the flight and of remote Nepal which served as base for the many months of preparation before the majestic Everest un-conquered its peaks to the intrepid Englishman.

trances, one from each alley, to the main drive.

Lawn and Garden
All unoccupied spaces on the lot will be landscaped and planted with lawns and flowers. A fireplace will be erected at the north corner of the lot in front of the building.

Big Basement
A basement underneath the whole building will house the heating plant and fuel room in the back, with a long corridor extending the width of the building in front of the main floor. This leads to the main floor and from this point to the mezzanine floor where quarters called the "swing room" are provided for employees during their unoccupied time. The men's toilet is located just off this room, other toilets on the main floor.

An office for a postoffice inspector will be located in the southwest corner of the basement.

Secret Look-out
A look-out post extending from the basement to the mezzanine floor is included which is for the exclusive use of an inspector, no one but an inspector or the janitor having access to this little room, the entrance to which is enclosed. From it the inspector can overlook all transactions on the main floor or basement, without being seen by anyone, as the peepholes are concealed. Once the building is completed and put into public use, not even the postmaster will have entrance to this vantage point. Its purpose is obvious.

Strong Vault
A large vault for the storage of cash and valuable mail in transit will be built on the main floor, opening into the clerks' business quarters. It will be of fireproof and burglar-proof construction and of ample size.
