FORD V-8 OVER THE TOP AGAIN

Colorado Springs, Colo.—Three men who all broke the record waged a spectacular and thrilling contest between themselves in the Labor Day stock car race on Pikes Peak for the Penrose Trophy. All three drove strictly stock Ford V-8's with optional equipment, all three had trained together and the race, both in car performance and individual ability, was as near even as is humanly possible.

The fact that all three men smashed the previous stock car record testifies to the closeness of the race. B. D. Hammond, the winner, had never been in a race before. Angelo Cimino, who finished second, had been in many races but had never been in the prize money. Glen Shultz, who finished third, had been in many races and usually in special racing machines in the open event.

Before the race Shultz had predicted that either of the other drivers could beat him. He said that Hammond was a more promising racing champion than any other young driver he had ever watched.

Tourist Travel To Boulder Dam Breaks Records

Heavy Influx of Sight-seers Expected Next Few Months

Travel to Boulder dam via Las Vegas during the last four months of this year will top the record-breaking influx of the first half of 1934 by at least 60 per cent, it was predicted yesterday by the Automobile Club of Southern California touring bureau.

During the first six months the club touring department received more than 100,000 personal and telephone calls per month for touring information. Since the dam has taken definite form and is rapidly nearing completion, Las Vegas and Boulder City interests also anticipate an enormous increase in fall travel.

Despite the listing of all available rooms in private homes, hotels and auto camps, some visitors to the Boulder dam area over the week-ends last spring encountered difficulties in finding accommodations. Although a building program is well underway for the benefit of tourists, motorists are being forewarned to make reservations in advance through the automobile club or other agency, and to plan their trips during the mid-week if possible to avoid possible crowded conditions over week-ends.

Visitors are to be permitted to enter the canyon during the next few months to view construction activities from the coffer dam, a feature of the guide service that will probably have to be eliminated after December 1 due to construction work and possible impounding of water in the reservoir.

"Chess As You Like It" This slogan has been adopted by the Torrance Chess Club as typifying its activities. Visitors are always most cordially welcome at the regular Monday and Thursday evening meetings in the Recreation Center, 1316 Cabrillo avenue.

Many unusual and artistic designs in hand-carved chess sets have been recorded from time to time in the history of the game. In fact the collection of rare and unique sets has been a hobby with not a few people. And now there comes to our notice a most unusual design in a chess set, owned by June Brewster, young screen actress, the pieces of which are carved to represent various motion picture celebrities.

The writer was once asked by a student how it was possible to have more than one queen on the board at the same instant in a game. He had been laboring under a misunderstanding regarding the rule applying to the elevation of a pawn when arriving at the eighth square.

In reply we here present a unique game played between two internationally renowned masters, Dr. Tarrash (white) and Dr. Alekhin (black), in the International Master Tournament at Moscow in 1915.

A CHESS PRIMER Lesson III

After having described the chess pieces and the board over which they are moved in the first two lessons, I would now like to describe the various moves of the different pieces.

Let us first take the Bishop (that piece with a diagonal slot in the head). If placed on any square of an otherwise vacant board it may be moved diagonally in any direction, any number of squares. When the board is occupied by other pieces and pawns, the Bishop may still be moved a number of free squares diagonally in any direction. When its line of move is interrupted by an opponent's piece or pawn the Bishop may capture by moving to occupy the square on which the opponent's piece or pawn stands after that latter piece has been removed. The capture is not compulsory.

These same rules apply exactly for the Rook except that this piece moves vertically and horizontally. The Queen has the combined identical rules for moving as the Bishop and Rook.
