

Petition Filed For Letters of Administration

Estate of Mrs. Amalie Kettler Said to Be In Excess of \$100,000

Recollections of the area that is now Torrance, in the latter part of the last century, were brought to mind among Torrance, "old timers" this week with the filing of a petition for letters of administration to the estate of the late Mrs. Amalie Kettler.

Mrs. Kettler was the widow of the late Emil Kettler, who came here as a settler in the 180's. He purchased 160 acres near the intersection of what now is Sepulveda and Redondo boulevards, and several years later acquired an adjoining 60 acres "to plant a windbreak," according to Attorney Benjamin Shipman, of Los Angeles, who is acting as attorney for the estate.

Some years ago, the quest for oil spread to the southwestern corner of the county, and oil was discovered on the land. It made its owners wealthy people. Mrs. Kettler left an estate in excess of \$100,000, according to Attorney Shipman. The woman left no will.

The petition for letters of administration is to be heard September 3, in department 24 of Los Angeles superior court.

Nine children, residing in Los Angeles, Orange and Stanislaus counties, will inherit the estate, the attorney said. None of them reside in Torrance, he stated.

Tax rates for the eight county sanitation districts will not be increased for the year 1935-36, with the possible exception of District No. 5, serving Torrance, Lomita and other southwestern cities, according to A. K. Warren, chief engineer. Torrance is served by districts 5 and 8.

Local Democrats Plan to Attend Roosevelt Rally

Prominent Democrats of the Southland Invited to Barbecue at Ham Cotton's

Planning to launch an "On With Roosevelt" movement which later will be expanded throughout the state, Democrats of Los Angeles, Orange and San Diego counties will gather at the Hamilton H. Cotton ranch at San Clemente on August 24, for a barbecue. It was announced yesterday.

A number of Democratic leaders from northern California also are expected to be present. The festivities are scheduled to begin at 10 a. m. and to last all day.

The Democrats are making much of the fact that their party registration is increasing rapidly in Los Angeles county and in virtually every other county of the state, despite the fact that this is an "off" political year.

Possibility of the re-organization of the Democratic county central committee of Los Angeles county is hinted at in the report that Chairman Barclay W. Bradley desires to resign, due to ill health, but that certain liberal elements of the party are insisting he retain his post, at least until next year.

Among those from Torrance who are contemplating attending the rally at San Clemente are Postmaster C. Earl Conner, City Judge Robert Lessing and Frank Perkin.

The county sanitation districts serve Torrance, Lomita and nearly a score of other cities and communities east, south and west of the city of Los Angeles, and also part of Los Angeles city.

Warren gave taxpayers this assurance following the regular August meeting of the various boards of directors, who are the mayors of the various cities, the chairman of the board of supervisors and the president of the Los Angeles city council. There is a possibility that the tax rate in some of the districts may be reduced, Warren intimated, but explained there were too many uncertain factors yet to state definitely. The county auditor has not yet announced the exact total assessed valuations after equalization by the county board of supervisors, and it is not yet definitely known what final valuation has been placed on the public utilities in the various districts, that are coming back on the county tax rolls for ad valorem tax levies this year.
