SAN DIEGO, Sept. 27.—Vivid details of her experience on the notorious "love boats" of China what Gandhi said to her and what she said to Gandhi. RELIGION offered as study AT UNIVERSITY

Members of various churches who are interested in adding to their knowledge of the doctrines of these denominations will be able to study them through the instruction of a course of study in the University of Southern California, which will be offered every Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock at Bridge hall, university campus, Los Angeles. Three hours of lec-

tures and study will be given each week in "Religion No. 60, The Church and Its Program." The course is an analytical survey of the origin, development, international distribution, organization and administration of the church program. Its tenets, forms of worship, practices, social services, and publications. Sections will be formed for the following groups: The Protestant churches, Catholic church, Episcopalian church, Jewish synagogue, and the Church of Jesus Christ, Latter Day Saints. Regular college credits for the

course will be given at U.S.C. but at U.C.L.A. and Los Angeles junior college, where the course will also be set up for students; no credits will be given. Each denomination will furnish its instructor who is required to have such educational degrees as will qualify him to be a member of the university faculty.
