

Dante's Inferno Brought to Screen

Six hundred and thirty years ago in Italy, a young man found time during political exile from his native Florence, to write a poem called "The Divine Comedy." The action of the poem covers eleven days and it took its author, Dante Alighieri six years to complete the job.

Now popularly known as "Dante's Inferno," although it also deals with Purgatory and Paradise, this work remains the most illuminating and luminous imaginative story of Hell ever created by man.
