Committee On Readjustment Will Meet Soon

Officers of Group of 21 to Be Selected At First Session

Organization meeting of the committee of 21 prominent citizens selected recently by Mayor Frank Shaw of Los Angeles to study possible ways of readjusting the cost of government in Los Angeles county will be held shortly, probably on October 15. It was learned today at the Los Angeles city hall.

Separation of the present city of Los Angeles from the county and the formation of a combined city and county government within the limits of the present city is one of five ways suggested by Mayor Shaw several months ago. Another possible way mentioned was the abolition of the county government, with the state itself rendering all governmental services not performed by the city.

The committee at its first meeting is to select a chairman and other officers. The mayor of the county's largest city has left it entirely up to the committee to decide which of several ways would be the most feasible and the most practical. Consolidation of city and county governments is also suggested as a possible solution.

For the past several weeks, members of the committee have been studying a comprehensive survey and report on "A study of local government in the metropolitan area of Los Angeles," turned out some months ago by the bureau of budget and efficiency of the city of Los Angeles. When the committee organizes, the membership will be split up into several committees to study different functions of government.
