

### New Buildings Planned For School District

#### Torrance and Lomita Are Included in List of New Projects

Plans for a new boys' physical education building at Torrance high school, and a new building for classes at Narbonne, are included in a building program announced by the Los Angeles city schools board of education this week.

The physical education building here will be erected at a cost of \$21,000, the Narbonne building improvement to cost \$110,000. In addition to these, 18 other projects are listed as new buildings in the district, and 20 school structures will be rehabilitated to conform to state building regulations.

The Narbonne unit was included in plans as long as two years ago but was abandoned at that time for lack of funds. It is badly needed, as the enrollment there this year exceeds 100, and conditions are badly overcrowded.

Total cost of the 38 projects will run to \$2,283,500.

### OIL FIELD production here IS STEADY

While Torrance field failed to show a gain in crude oil production this past week, other fields in the Los Angeles basin increased their output by 6,120 barrels, with the state as a whole gaining only 1,720 barrels daily average over the preceding week. Torrance produced a daily average of 6,950 as against 7,000 barrels for the previous period.

Inglewood accounted for the bulk of the gain in this basin, averaging 17,030 barrels daily as against 13,500 for the prior week. Long Beach gained 1,150 barrels daily to a figure of 78,150.

Kettleman Hills continues to be the banner producing field of the state, averaging 94,200, a gain of 200 barrels over the week before. Total daily average production for the entire state the past week was reported at 644,270 barrels.

will was the holder of a Smith-Hughes certificate, which entitled the school to receive state aid for its agricultural project. A number of years ago, a bill was passed by Congress, called the Smith-Hughes bill, by which the federal government matched funds with states for the purpose of fostering industrial, mechanical, or agricultural instruction in the schools. Recently the federal government has withdrawn its support, but the work is carried on by the states, in California and elsewhere. These projects required the employment of an instructor who had

had practical experience in the lines along which the schools proposed to carry on. Mr. Merrill was the holder of one of these valued certificates, and in order to continue to receive state aid here, an instructor must be secured who will also have that added asset.

The project was first launched in Torrance by Thomas C. Elson when he was principal of the high school years ago, and with a few lapses, has been continued ever since.

Besides carrying on his work at the Torrance high school, which was of such an exceptional character that students from other communities came to Torrance to enroll in his

classes, Merrill conducted classes in night school at Redondo Beach. He resided at 807 El Redondo, in that city. He leaves a widow and eight children.
