NEW WING OF NARBONNE HIGH READY FOR USE

Acres Adjoining School Bought to Provide Room For Laboratory and Field Work

To provide room for field and laboratory work in the agriculture study department of the Narbonne high school a full acre of land adjoining the school grounds south of the tennis courts has been purchased by the Los Angeles School Board.

The new ground will be used as an experimental field in the study of agricultural techniques by the students of the Lomita institution.

Principal Clementina de Forest Griffin also announced that they hoped to build new tennis courts on the new acreage adjacent to the one now in use.

Completed at a cost of about \$10,000 the boys' wing of the new Narbonne high school will be ready for service when school opens this term.

Very well equipped, the new building includes a locked room, two shower rooms, a drying room, a room for corrective exercises, director's quarters and lavatories.

The new girls' wing and the main block of class rooms will not be ready for use until about the first of November. A shortage of materials due to the condition of the steel market was responsible for the delay, Principal Griffin stated.

New Style Annual Designed By Staff

With an eye to producing something different in the way of school annuals the members of the staff for the Torrance High School Year Book have decided on a magazine style of makeup for the publication.

Stress on student life will be the chief feature of the new publication, which will include candid camera shots and action pictures taken during the school year.
