contribute only 20 percent of the cost of the harbor.

In order to secure this federal co-operation, according to the engineer, it is necessary to have complete information as to the location, probable cost, feasibility and necessity for the construction. On assembling such information, army engineers are invited to view the location and pass on the four points. If the project meets with their approval, the work of forming a district is then in order and matters can proceed.

According to Mr. Rippey, the first cost of procedure under this set-up will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000, which includes the fee of the engineers employed to make the preliminary survey, cost of drawing up the necessary petition, and publication costs.

Mr. Rippey plans to take the matter up with the directors of the local harbor association to devise plans for continuing the work of promoting the construction of the barge canal thru this section. He also plans to contact the harbor division of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce to lay the matter before them and request their co-operation in bringing it to a successful conclusion.

Preliminary work of surveying the terrain has shown that the plan is entirely feasible, and can be completed at a comparatively low cost considering the importance of the work.
