On Saturday afternoon 85 children took part in the Easter egg hunt at the playground on Cabrillo Avenue. Richard Newman's efforts were very profitable as during the search he found a worn and faded dollar bill which made him the center of envy of all the other 84 kids.

A wiener bake at the park attracted many youngsters including a large group from Walteria, who had a big time and lots to eat.

General Petroleum Enlarges Scope of Marketing; Promotions Follow



ward, a length of approximately 4.8 miles; traffic stripe to be painted. All of the work on these improvements will be performed by the city including the acquisition of rights-of-way on Project 3, with the exception of traffic striping on Project No. 4 which will be done by the state. The cost of construction, \$5415, on project No. 4, route 164, \$200; making a total of \$5615 to be paid out of the gasoline tax allocation. Balance of the cost of these improvements, \$6851, to be defrayed from the state co-operative fund.

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State Board Starts Removal of Billboards

Outdoor Signs Removed From Highways As Traffic Menace

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.)—California's war on signboards erected along highways began in earnest recently when the department of public works started removing billboards which violated provisions of the outdoor advertising act.

The act became a law August 21, 1933, but a six months' "grace" period was allowed for the purpose of giving board owners a chance to save their property.

Under terms of the act, signs and structures are subject to removal if they violate the following provisions:

- 1—If within 300 feet of an intersection or intercepting highway, except in subdivided areas or in cases where buildings already obscure the view of the motorists.
- 2—If within 300 feet of an intersecting highway and railroad right-of-way.
- 3—If obstructing clear view of the approach of vehicles on highway for a distance of 100 feet.
- 4—If within the highway right-of-way.
- 5—If imitating warning, stop or danger signals.
- 6—If with red light or blinking lights likely to be mistaken for a danger signal.
- 7—If in a drainage channel.
- 8—If unsafe for storms and wind.

The drive against advertising signs will be directed particularly toward boards located in the vicinity of curves, intersections, underpasses, bridges and railroad crossings, or within drainage channels where flood menace may occur, according to Morgan Keaton, assistant deputy director of public works, who is in charge of the campaign.
