Unequal Distribution of Gasoline Tax and License Funds Is Shown

Exactly how the county's gasoline tax and license receipts for the past six years have been distributed among the 44 municipalities was set forth today in an analysis laid before the board of supervisors.

The analysis, prepared by the Pasadena city planning commission, reveals what local property owners have long suspected, namely, that the city of Los Angeles is receiving more than its entitled to on the basis of population.

Los Angeles, with 65 1/2 per cent of the county's population, has received nearly 68 per cent of the funds, the analysis shows. Long Beach, with 7 1/2 per cent of the

gate, where a similar situation exists, also has been favored. Manhattan Beach has received more than five times its share as computed by population. With 11 per cent of the population it has profited by receiving 57 per cent of the allocations. This figure to \$52.37 per capita while the average per capita figure for the five years is only \$9.19 for all the cities.

The city of Torrance with 38 per cent of population has received 59 per cent of allocation, or a per capita allocation of \$14.13.

The figures upon which the analysis is based cover the period from 1927-28 to February, 1934.
