Deer Season In Southern Dists. Opens August 1

Hunters Prepare for Annual Hot and Dusty Trek After Venison

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.)—It won't be long now until venison steak will be found on the tables of California's hunters.

August 1 marks the opening of the 1934 deer season, a season, incidentally, that promises to be one of the best the sportsmen have enjoyed for a long time.

On that date it will be legal to seek deer in all of Sonoma, Yolo, Solano, Napa, Marin, Alameda, Contra Costa, Santa Clara, San Benito, Santa Cruz, and Monterey counties, and in parts of Mendocino, Lake, Colusa, San Joaquin, Merced, Sacramento, Stanislaus, Kings and Fresno counties.

Fish and game wardens stationed throughout this first area to open, including districts 2, 2½ and 3, report that deer are plentiful this year and in excellent condition. The season extends to September 14.

In calling attention to the opening of the deer season, state fish and game officials pointed out that spotlight hunting is illegal, as is shooting from automobiles. Hunters also must be careful to refrain from taking deer into a closed season area until the tag is countersigned properly.

The limit is two bucks per hunter in all of the districts except the Modoc area, where the annual tag deer is protected by a one-buck limit.

On August 16 the season opens in the southern districts of 2½, 4 and 4½, and in districts 1, 2, 3, 4½, 23 and 25, from September 1 to October 15.

Hunters throughout the state legally kill an average of 23,000 deer a year. Game officials estimate that there are probably as many as 100,000 deer in the state's forest areas.

NEVA FAILS TO SHOW FOR TUESDAY GAME; BIRDS LOSE

The Torrance Bluebirds tightened their hold on first place in the National night loop Friday night by defeating Santa Ana with whom they were tied, 6-5, in 14 innings.

What little advantage they gained there, they lost Tuesday night when Fullerton smacked them down, 11-4.

Loss of the game was due to the failure of Louie Neva to get back from a trip out of town in time for the game. Louie wired Spud that he would be unable to play, but the wire was delivered too late in the afternoon to allow Spud to reach Pete Hargis who is playing with a San Pedro team. Spud was forced to put Hal Forney in to pitch against the Fullerton boys who were not slow to take advantage of the break.

Hal, U. S. C. ace hard ball pitcher, is just a good average chucker in the night ball game and while he is good enough for the average team he is not heavy enough to go against the artillery of the night loop teams.

Spud says that Louie will be back in plenty of time for the game tomorrow night, and if not he will have Hargis on the job.

Anaheim comes here tomorrow night, and the Birds will have to take this game if they want to stay in the running for the championship. The loss of Tuesday night's game is a serious blow, as competition is so keen among six out of the eight teams that one little slip spells ruin for the contenders.

A drive to underwrite the game or \$30,000 was successful.

After the football game plans are complete, steps will be taken on a big international tennis tournament, a golf championship and other sports.

The association, composed of 31 New Orleans civic organizations, was organized early this year to provide the city with an amateur sports carnival during the tourist season leading up to Mardi Gras.

NEW TEAM MAKES GOOD SHOWING ON FIRST TIME OUT


