Many Loans Aid Modernization of Calif. Homes

More than a thousand loans to modernize homes, business premises and farm buildings have been made by Bank of America in cooperation with the Federal Housing Administration. Will F. Morrish, president, announced today. "The number of loans already made indicates clearly that a demand exists for this type of credit," said Morrish, "and the volume of applications is on the increase throughout the entire state. To date, Bank of America has loaned \$391,500 to carry out 1003 individual modernization projects under the terms of the National Housing Act. At least as many applications are pending and the loans will be completed as soon as estimates of construction costs are supplied by the borrowers. "So far, the principal demand for housing loans has come from the state's metropolitan areas," said Morrish. "This is probably because of the fact that farmers have not yet learned that this type of loan can be made to improve farm buildings and that their payments need not be made in monthly installments, but can be scheduled for payment when their crop money is received."

Chess Primer Lesson III

Let us first take the Bishop (that piece with a diagonal slot in the head). If placed on any square of an otherwise vacant board it may be moved diagonally in any direction, any number of squares. When the board is occupied by other pieces and pawns, the Bishop may still be moved a number of free squares diagonally in any direction. When its line of move is interrupted by an opponent's piece or pawn the Bishop may capture by moving to occupy the square on which the opponent's piece or pawn stands after that latter piece has been removed. The capture is not compulsory.
