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Home Co-Operation Suggested In Campaign Against Dishonesty

In an effort to reduce petty dishonesty among students at the high school, the school authorities, assisted by teachers and the students themselves, are putting on a campaign for education in sportsmanship and fair play. The student control board, Varsity Club and other groups

aid by patrolling the grounds and buildings, putting on contests in athletics, oratory and other types of activity which foster the spirit of fair play and mutual respect.

The campaign has met with considerable success, and the response is better than expected.

The co-operation of the parents is suggested in the following appeal of the school authorities:

"In the present epoch of world development, our younger people are accustomed to hear from their elders, continual expressions of doubt as to the honesty of most Americans holding public office. Unfortunately, this discussion is often coupled with outspoken envy and admiration for those who can get away with it."

The natural result is a lowering of the standards of personal honesty among the members of the rising generation, who long to emulate these figures that occupy the "lime-light." Therefore, we find a great deal of petty thievery among children of school age, who yield to temptation, thinking their actions blamable only if they happen to be caught.

Teachers and parents must work together on this problem, since the portion of a child's life spent in his school environment is compared to that spent among his family and friends. The school influences must be supplemented and extended by home training. Children must be taught that honesty begets self-respect, and the child who learns to test his actions by the Golden Rule will soon be a benefactor. But children must also learn to defend themselves against dishonesty, as they will have to do when they become adults—that is, by taking good care to guard their own possessions.

Young people have also the responsibility of helping their fellows to become honest citizens; first, by setting an example of perfect honesty and truth; and second, by being careful not to throw temptation in the way of others, especially those known to be weak in this respect.

The American home and the American public school together, must ceaselessly strive to raise the standard of honesty in American life, only so can our citizens be worthy the respect of themselves, their fellows, and the other members of the coming family of nations."

Oil Rig Destroyed By Fire Sunday

The Torrance fire department was called out at 1:35 a. m. Sunday to fight a fire at Rig No. 7, Kite & Pagers property located on 23rd street near Narbonne. When the firemen arrived, the oil rig was beyond saving and they confined their efforts to protecting other property in the vicinity. The blaze is said to have been caused by friction from a slipping belt. A neighbor who turned in the alarm reported that he saw the light from the blaze but before he could get out of his house, the flames had shot up over the crown block. The oil-soaked rig was destroyed within a few minutes.

Jameson Talks

Col. N. F. Jameson, of Torrance, who is in charge of the district employment office stated that about 7,000 men are now employed in building the aqueduct, and the average rate is \$5.40 for an eight hour day. Excellent meals and good beds are furnished at a maximum charge of \$1.40 a day, he said. All employees must be citizens and there is no age limit, he stated. At present 50 men from Torrance are employed and the benefits in payrolls to Torrance citizens will approximate \$300,000 during the construction period of the aqueduct, Jameson said.
