Bonds Are Sold For Aqueduct Construction

R. F. C. Takes Block of \$11,164,000 Offered For Sale

Another \$11,164,000 was available today for construction work on the Colorado aqueduct, which is to bring Colorado river water to Torrance and other member cities of the district, following the sale of additional bonds to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The bids were sold to the R. F. C. when no private bids were submitted. The R. F. C. has committed itself to purchase any bonds that may be needed to finance the work for the next several months. The R. F. C. now has purchased a total of \$53,500,000 of Metropolitan water district bonds, out of the \$220,000,000 issue authorized several years ago.

By a difference of some 600 votes, Compton city last week voted to stay in the district. Approximately 1,350 votes were cast in favor of withdrawing from the district, and more than 2,000 voters acceded to the pleas of water district officials to stay in the district. The city voted itself in the district prior to the serious earthquake of March 10, 1933.

Fire Warden Issues Warning To Smokers

County Forester and Fire Warden Spence D. Turner has issued a warning that due to the heavy rainfall of the past winter there has been created a serious fire menace from the luxuriant growth of annual grasses. He urges extreme care in the use of camp fires and cigarettes. Due to the rapid drying out of this grass the fire season is 30 days ahead of schedule.

"With the rainfall nearly 50 percent above normal, the grass and weeds are higher and denser than ever before in my experience of fire fighting in Los Angeles county," said Turner. "This grass is rapidly turning brown and dry and constitutes an extreme fire menace. We do not want a repetition of some of the disastrous fires we have had in the past, and so request that extreme care be taken at all times. Do not light an open fire without first obtaining a permit. Read carefully the conditions under which the permit is issued. Ordinance 1897 N. S. regulating the use of fire in the unincorporated territory of the county will be enforced."

"On May 1, the 'no smoking' regulation went into effect. This closes all unincorporated territory of the county to smoking until the end of the fire season about November 30." Turner points out that it will be unlawful to set fire or smoke tobacco in any form in any mountainous, brush or forest covered land or land covered with any inflammable material. It will also be unlawful to smoke upon any road or trail in such hazardous territory. Turner explained that this would not prohibit building a fire or smoking within an established camp site or within places of habitation.

The county department of forests and fire warden is posting "no smoking" signs in all hazardous areas and no leniency will be shown those disregarding the fire season rules. Forester Turner appeals especially to the sportsmen to assist in protecting the fish and game resources of the county by observing these rules as fishing season opens May 1, as well. According to Turner, the federal forest service put into effect their "no smoking" regulations on the national forests in Southern California at the same time (May 1) due to the increased amount of dry annual growth.


