Big Time Eastern Crews Meet Western Rowers At Long Beach

One of America's oldest and most thrilling sports... eight-oared crew racing... comes to California again this year with a regatta of national importance scheduled for the Long Beach marine stadium June 28 and 29. U. C. L. A., one of the newest entrants into big time collegiate rowing circles, is acting as host for the event and has arranged to entertain the University of Pennsylvania, Syracuse, University of Wisconsin, University of California and University of Washington, all outstanding oarsmen in their various sections. Aiding U. C. L. A. in staging the event are the Los Angeles and the Long Beach Junior Chambers of Commerce.

Entrants in the coming regatta are to participate in the world-famous Poughkeepsie regatta on June 18, and immediately after it, will entrain for Southern California, arriving here in time for five days of practice before the event. There will be two days of racing, with two of the six crews to be eliminated on the first day and the remaining four to fight it out in the finals. Several rowing events for Southern California rowing clubs, special diving and other water exhibitions and all the pageantry which traditionally makes a rowing regatta have been arranged.

To accommodate the expected crowd of more than 25,000 spectators, the Long Beach city authorities are rebuilding the grand stand which is unique in rowing circles as it allows a full view of the 2000-meter course, and enlarging the automobile parking
