

Dog Lover's Ordeal In Motion Picture Now At Plaza

And the dog would gaze at Richards in hurt wonder and apparent bewilderment, as if to ask: "Why are you so nice to me, at one time, and then rebuke me the next?"

Richards was so overcome with compassion for the deprecate animal that he has provided for the care of the dog for the rest of its life.

Now Starring In "Black Fury"



No other first line star in motion pictures has appeared in so few films as has Paul Muni.

His latest First National picture, "Black Fury," showing at the Torrance Theatre Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, is only his eighth production, yet he is considered one of the most important male stars in Hollywood.

Muni averaged only one picture a season until this year when he made both "Black Fury" and "Bordertown."

Six years ago Paul Muni was brought from the New York stage to Hollywood for the first time. On that trip he made two pictures, "The Valiant" and "Seven Faces." More than a year later he returned to star in "Scarface" and two years elapsed before he came back to the film city a third time to make "I Am a Fugitive From a Chain Gang," "The World Changes" and "Hi, Nellie!" followed, but with long intervals between.

Muni is violently opposed to quantity production so far as his own stardom is concerned. He holds to his original decision never to make more than two pictures a year.
