A booth at the city celebration and the September dinner meeting will comprise the business of the evening.



Labor Day Is Here! Last Picnic Of Year



LAST picnic of the year! Labor Day has come to remind us that summer will soon be over. Soon the children will be off to school. All the gay, summer activities will give way to winter work and winter fun. But not before we have one final summer picnic, grander and more glorious than we've had all year.

Food will be packed easily and quickly, a made up salad put into a tightly covered jar, plenty of sandwiches, liberally spread with real mayonnaise to keep them from drying out, wrapped carefully in waxed paper. Hard boiled eggs added and, last but not least, coffee.

Here are a few suggestions that may be useful in preparing your Labor Day picnic:

Dried Beef and Cheese Sandwiches:
1 cup chopped dried beef
1/2 cup grated cheese
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup mayonnaise

Mix dried beef, cheese and celery thoroughly and add enough real mayonnaise to moisten. Spread between slices of white or whole wheat bread spread with butter or vegetable margarine. Makes enough filling for 8 sandwiches.

Corned Beef and Celery Sandwiches (a hearty sandwich):
1 pound cooked corned beef, finely chopped
1/2 cup capers, finely cut
1 small onion, finely chopped
1 tablespoon horseradish mustard
1/2 cup real mayonnaise

To real mayonnaise add other ingredients and blend thoroughly. Spread between thin slices of bread spread with butter or vegetable margarine. Makes 1/2 cup filling.



Bacon and Pickle Sandwiches (a hearty sandwich):
1/2 cup real mayonnaise
2 fill pickles, finely chopped
6 slices bacon, broiled crisp, and finely chopped

To real mayonnaise add other ingredients and blend thoroughly. Spread between thin slices of bread spread with butter or vegetable margarine. Makes 1/2 cup filling.

Blend all ingredients together thoroughly. Spread between slices of rye bread, spread with butter or vegetable margarine. Makes enough filling for 12 sandwiches.
