The thrills supplied by Friday's program include one that has been purposely planned, one that will launch a thousand gasps, and will probably start the fans jabbering to themselves. It consists of sending a fifty-mile per hour car into a series of barrel rolls—a bounding, bouncing box of danger with the driver at the wheel inside—hoping to emerge at the end of a dozen or so barrel rolls and twists—and the date is Friday the 13th.

That is not all. As for competition—the Chamberlain-Pepper Perpetual Challenge Trophy for team racing goes into competition Friday night, as the Long Beach Pirates tackle the Gilmore Cubs in the first defense of the magnificent cups and figurines, created by the famous Pine Avenue firm of silversmiths and jewellers who are such ardent fans.

The Cubs have yet to score a team win, and this will be the first time the Pirates have defended their trophy. What is more interesting is the fact that the rival captains, Karl Young of the Cubs and Bob Swanson of the Pirates are the pair who staged that breathtaking duel in the forty lap main event last Friday—with Bob copping the verdict—and top money.

Junior Colleges Are Getting Set For 1935 Season

Compton Starts Free Lance Schedule Against San Bernardino Sept. 28

Compton Junior College, which was herded out of its league last year, due to alleged infractions of rules, and which afterwards declined to come back into the fold, but arranged a free lance schedule for this fall will open its schedule with a game against San Bernardino, on September 28. The Tartars will have three open dates during the season, which will be left open to give the team a rest period before some of its hardest games.

The junior division football squad will play only six games, starting with Santa Monica on October 11, Redondo Union, high October 18, Inglewood, November 1, Beverly Hills, November 8, Herbert Hoover at San Diego, November 15 and Woodrow Wilson, November 22.

Los Angeles junior college has a nine-game schedule, starting September 28 against U. C. L. A. frosh, and closing with Ventura November 22. Other games will be played against Bakersfield, Long Beach, Pasadena, Santa Monica, San Francisco, and Glendale, with November 9 open.

San Francisco has been only recently established and this game will be non-conference.

Racing Held On Three Nights At Pomona Fair

Unprecedented Number of Entries Makes Evening Program Necessary

POMONA.—Because of the unprecedented number of entries, Secretary-Manager C. B. Atterbaugh announced that it had been definitely decided to stage three night races during the 17-day program. At the same time Atterbaugh also announced the names of the officials who will preside over the speed events. The night races will be held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 23, 24 and 25. Pari-mutual betting will be on week day afternoons only, due to the state regulations.

Frank Liesinger, racing secretary of the Western Fairs Association and veteran starter of harness horse races, will again serve in that capacity at Pomona.

Both harness and running races will be scheduled for each afternoon of the race meeting. There will be pari-mutual wagering on both kinds of races.

It is expected that there will be more than 1000 race horses here for the meeting.

"Wonderful Actor" Is Draught Horse
