



### Narbonne Plays Gardena

#### First Game of Marine League Season Will Be Played At Mohicans Field

Tomorrow, October 4, at 3 p. m. on the Mohicans' field, the Green and Gold of Narbonne will tangle with Gardena high in their first league game of the season.

In the last five years the two schools have met three times, with Narbonne on top with two wins.

In the encounter with the Mohicans five years ago, Narbonne came home with the laurels to the tune of 13 to 0. Two years later the Gauchos again administered a lesson. This time it was 35 to 6. But last year it was a different story when Gardena turned the tables on the Gauchos with a clean-cut 13-0 victory.

Candidates for the Narbonne football eleven are still battling for their respective positions. The Gauchos have several veterans out which means a fairly strong team for this season.

Some promising prospects for the different positions are as follows: Tidmarsh at fullback, Gordon Woods and Delbert Clay-

ton, left halfback; Junior Haniash and Don Hart, right halfback; Bill Brians and Arnold Hansen, left end; Lloyd Powell and Gordon Arrasmith, right end; Dillon Moore and Jack Lovell, left guard; Wallace Mayer and Tony Alongo and Lloyd Jones, right guard.

Thormod Cook and Charles Lupin, left tackle; Leo Savant and Levi Savage, right tackle; Stanley Nietupski and Eddie Tapie, center.

One of the most brilliant players so far—according to Coach Sloss—is Lee Savant, who was mentioned for All-Marine tackle last year. Billy Brians, who was ineligible last season, is a promising prospect at end.

Johnny has been out with an injured knee which is still in bad shape, but is under treatment and he may be able to play at least part of the game. Hubert Luck, another speedy end who is having his first season at that position, is also on the side lines with an injured ankle but will probably be ready to play tomorrow, as he has been kept out for two weeks to give his ankle a chance to get well.

The Tartars have a fine fighting outfit this year which makes up for its lack of experience by its determined attack and stubborn defense. The Tartars are out to take the championship for the second year and have good prospects of doing so.

If anybody has trouble in buying a duck stamp this year, it will not be the fault of J. N. ("Ding") Darling.


Darling, who is the chief of the biological surveys, has told the state game departments, "if you find any locations where duck stamps are not available, let me know and I will see that they are supplied."

Last year some sportsmen and stamp collectors had trouble in buying the duck stamps, but the law has been amended so that the stamps may be sold at any postoffice and to anybody. They cost \$1 each. Proceeds go to provide refuges for waterfowl.

Coaches Fight Age Limit For Prep Athletes

Reduction in the age limit for Texas high school athletes has moved coaches in the state to ask a referendum of school principals and superintendents before the 18-year-old maximum becomes effective in September, 1936. Reduction of the present 20-year-old maximum was ordered last spring.
