

Plans Rushed For Farm To Market Roads

Palos Verdes Highway Included in Projects Built With Federal Funds

Plans and specifications for the four so-called "farm to market roads" which the National Emergency Council proposes to build in Los Angeles county were being rushed to completion this week by the county road department.

The four projects are the San Gabriel Canyon road from Camp Honota westerly to Fellows Camp, Palos Verdes Coast Highway near Portuguese Bend, Imperial Highway from the Orange county line westerly to Luitweller avenue, and Saddle Peak road from Murphy road to Dry Canyon road.

Appropriation of \$1,992,445 was made to Los Angeles county, as authorized recently, from the Federal Emergency Highway Fund. Los Angeles county is to receive 73 percent of the \$7,500,000 of the federal fund that has been allocated to California, according to Col. Jerome F. Sears, of the National Emergency Council's California office.

The Palos Verdes road may be termed a "farm to market" road, however, since there are several hundreds of acres of truck gardens on the southern slopes of the Palos Verdes Hills on either side of the coast highway that extends between Redondo Beach and San Pedro.

Contracts for these four projects must be awarded by December 15, according to the established limitations, Jones said. The four projects are understood to have the approval of President Roosevelt, and to have been set up by the controller-general's office.

Bids to Be Opened On Lomita Blvd.

Improvement of Lomita boulevard between Narbonne and Alhambra avenues will be undertaken by Los Angeles county about November 1, it was assured today when the board of supervisors advertised for bids for the work.

Paving, curbs, sidewalks and drainage structures will be constructed under the contract, for a distance of 567 feet. The pavement will be laid on a disintegrated rock base, according to the specifications.

October 21 was set for opening of bids, in the meeting room of the board of supervisors, in Los Angeles.

Mrs. Henderson, Librarian In Torrance 22 Years to Retire

With the hope of a beautiful library building now assured by the very favorable bond issue vote, Mrs. Isabel Henderson, librarian since November, 1913, sees her dream of many years coming true, for when she retires October 12th she will have served the residents of Torrance as their librarian for 22 years.

Mrs. Henderson's own telling of the beginning of the Torrance library would be much more effective than mine, but she is too unassuming to seek credit for the splendid work which she has done and to which she has so wholeheartedly devoted her time, her thought and strength.

If Mrs. Henderson were to relate the history of the library, she could tell of how Mr. Jared Sidney Torrance and his friends in 1913 collected a stock of 300 books and made them available to any who wished to borrow them. This book collection was opened at Mrs. Henderson's home at 1304 Gramercy avenue, with Mrs. Henderson as the librarian. To the assistance of this embryo library, the Los Angeles county library soon offered help and on February 6, 1914, the first shipment of county books was delivered. Up to June 30, 1914, the library's first official year, which was really only a half year, there were 193 registered borrowers and 510 books in stock on which a circulation of 2,021 was reported.

At the end of the first ten years, June 30, 1924, the registered borrowers numbered 1,440, the books on hand had grown to 8,098 and the circulation amounted to 13,129. At the end of the second decade, the borrowers were 2,022, the book stock numbered 5,701 volumes and the circulation record had increased to 38,298, or 192% in ten years. And in addition to the books on the local shelves, the patrons were receiving from the county central library an average of 100 books per month.

But to go back to the story of the library's housing. In 1917 it was moved to a room in an unused school building and there it remained until in 1922, when it was housed for a few months in the old Dominguez Land Corporation building and from which it was moved to its present location.

Mrs. Henderson could recall from her rich experience the tastes in reading of many residents and the development of the reading interests of many a boy and girl from childhood to adult years. There is probably no other profession, except possibly that of a physician or clergyman, in which the joys and tribulations of persons come more readily than to a librarian. The librarian indeed frequently becomes a guide and philosopher as well as a friend.

To Mrs. Henderson, as she retires from the arduous duties about to come with the erection of a building, the county librarian pays tribute to her splendid spirit of co-operation and her fine appreciation of good literature. I believe the citizens of Torrance also wish to join in this acknowledgment of the devoted years of service which Mrs. Henderson has given so effectively and which are now about to be crowned by the acquisition of a beautiful new library building.
