## Paris Styles

PARIS (U.P.)—Ruby and Etruscan reds, soft sapphire blue, emerald green as well as gold and bronze shades are outstanding in the graceful draped evening gowns that are featured this season in the new shadowed velvets.

These gowns are worn with Renaissance capes trimmed in mink or ermine. The gowns are set off by jeweled belts, and the predominating color in the stones of the belt is frequently carried out in the lining of the cape. For example, an evening ensemble in dark green velvet is worn with a jeweled belt of dull gold studded with coral, jade, emeralds, sapphires and crystal, while coral colored lame lines the coat, which is trimmed with sable.

The military style, which has made such inroads on feminine fashion, can be traced back to the latter part of the last century. The come-back has undergone important alterations, however, and the new silhouette is improved and softened. Apart from sports and street clothes, which are trimmed with military braid, soutache and are worn with martial hats, fashions are very feminine this winter.

The 18th century style of long redingote is shown in velvet with loose, full cuffs and a cape-like collar of beaver. It is worn with a felt hat the same shade as the beaver fur, fashioned on the halo style and trimmed with brown and pale pink ostrich tips. The costume is completed with a small beaver muff adorned by a tiny posy of roses.

The next business meeting of the club will be held on December 2.

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
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
