Recommend Low Bids

City Engineer Leonard and Walker & Eisen, architects, recommended the acceptance of the low bids of W. W. Petley & C. Metcham, Santa Monica contractors, for the auditorium at \$49,300 and the city hall and jail at \$52,000; and also the low bid of \$23,267 for the library submitted by R. J. Daum, Los Angeles contractor. No action was taken by the city council Tuesday night on the recommendations, as official notice of the FWA award had not been received.

The first installment of real estate taxes and all of the taxes on personal property for the current year must be paid not later than 5 o'clock p. m., December 5, after which date penalties of eight percent will be added.

For the convenience of the taxpayers, H. L. Byram, county tax collector, states that the office will be open until 5 o'clock p. m. next Saturday.

Tax collections to date amount to more than \$200,000.00 over collections for the same period last year. As of the close of business on November 23 tax collections for this year amounted to \$10,169,302.94 as compared with \$9,963,609.52 for the cor-

Publications of delinquencies will include a description of the property and an alphabetical index to the owners.

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
