Compton Five Meets Pasadena In J. C. Opener

Two Intersectional Games Listed By Tartar Squad For This Season

Compton Junior College officially opens its 1935 basketball season this week-end with two games billed. In its season's opener, the Tartars will travel to Pasadena to meet the Crown City Jaysee Friday night. On Saturday night, the Tartars will play host to Riverside Junior College, rated as one of the favorites in the Orange Empire Conference.

Although it is not as strong as last year's quintet, which won 13 out of 14 conference and play-off games, Gordon Clark has a formidable five that should win the majority of its games.

The Tartars have a trio of high class forwards in Carl "Whitney" Hallen, veteran, Steve Belko and Dick Yonston. Belko was a star end on the Tartar football team and is hailed as an even greater basketball star.

Two intersectional games have been scheduled by the Tartars. Their first game with a team north of the Tehachapi mountains will be played on January 3, when the Tartar five travels to Taft J. C. On January 16, Menlo Jaysee will come south to meet the Tartars at Compton.

Zamperini First In All-City Race

Running against a field of 80 entrants, yesterday, Louis Zamperini, world's champion miler, took first in the Los Angeles city high schools cross country run held over the U. C. L. A. course at Westwood. Louie's time for the two miles was 10:22, and he beat out Madrid of Belmont by about 40 yards. Three other Torrance entrants, Kirkpatrick, Schimmick and Harestad, finished in the order named in 59th, 60th and 61st places.

Louie failed to better his time of last year over a similar course, as he has not yet got down to real hard training for the season, but expects to begin work for the various events leading up to the Olympic try-outs soon after the first of the year.

Olympic Boycott Is Defeated At A.A.U. Session

United States Athletes Will Be Permitted to Compete At Berlin

United States athletes will take part in the Olympic Games at Berlin in August. After a heated session of two days, Friday and Saturday of last week, the American Athletic Union closed its convention at New York, with the decision for participation.

No vote was taken on the actual question of taking part, but the stand was reached through the defeat of resolutions which called for a boycott of the Games, and of a proposal to form a committee of three to investigate the charges of discrimination lodged against the Nazi regime.

Former Supreme Court Justice Jeremiah T. Mahoney, president of the A. A. U., who has been actively opposed to participation, announced that he would not be a candidate for any office in the A. A. U. Avery Brundage, chairman of the American Olympic committee, was elected president for the seventh time. Seth Van Patten, Los Angeles, president of the California Interscholastic Federation, and secretary of the Pacific Coast A. A. U., was elected second vice president of the national body.

Championship awards for 1936 include Los Angeles Athletic Club as host to the senior handball competition. Men's indoor track and field events will be held in New York City. No awards were announced for senior outdoor track and field, men's and women's senior outdoor swimming, ice hockey or weightlifting events.

Tackles—Roger McGinnis, all-Marine league tackle, '34, great defensive player, smart and aggressive. Weight 200 pounds. Herman Hamman, all-Marine league tackle, '31. Greatest tackle to ever play for Torrance. Smart aggressive and a great fighting heart. Weight 180 pounds.

Guards—Charles Smith, all-Marine league, second team guard, '34, all-Marine league fullback, '35. By far best guard to ever play for local school. Likes going tough and always opened up holes for his teammates. Good blocker, very few yards made over him by opposing teams. Weight 200 pounds. Tony Natale, played one year for the Tartars, '31, but made such an impression on football fans that he was given first choice for right guard position. Went east and was chosen all-State guard of Illinois, '32. Weight 180 pounds.

Quarterback—Robert Trezise, all-Marine league, '35. Best punter to ever play for Torrance. Perfect blocker, smart field general, fast and keeps his

team on their toes at all times. Has a one more year to play. Weight 150 pounds.
Halfbacks—Jack Javens, by far best backfield man to ever play at Torrance high school. All-Marine league right half, '34, '35. Perfect blocker, fast and good broken field runner, best conversion kicker, smart and aggressive. Picked on coaches' (second string) all Los Angeles city schools' team. Good pass receiver. Weight 175 pounds. Harold Watson, best left half to ever play for the Tartars, good blocker, good passer, fast and good line plunger. Played safety man on defensive. Weight 180 pounds.
Fullback—Ted Adzovich, picked over such great players as

Figueredo, Jones, Barnard and Buchman, as the greatest fullback of all times. Ted was a great line plunger and broken field runner, fighter from start to finish, good at converting goals and always kept the team in high spirits. Good blocker and knows football. Weight 160 pounds.

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
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
