### Work of Noted Artists Shown At the Library

Thirteen new water color sketches adorn the walls of the public library lecture room, replacing the exhibit of block prints and color work which was brought down from Los Angeles at the opening of the new building.

The new exhibit is furnished by the Federal Arts Project. All of the sketches are interesting, and will appeal to the art lover since they present a wide variety of subjects.

To the one who just "likes pictures" probably the most attractive sketch will be the "Mecca Pastoral" by Henri de Kruijff, with its skillful blend of vivid coloring and its suggestion of happy idle days, or Dana Bartlett's "Green Field."

Historical Scenes

For those who like a flavor of the local and historical there is the "Inlet, Balboa" by Dana Bartlett, "Eagle Hotel—Old Stage Depot," "Schoolhouse—Scott Bar," "Chinese Joss House, Weaverville," by Wm. S. McCall.

"Sunday At the Brickyards" by Stephen de Hospodar, admirably portrays the mournful silence and loneliness of a hive of industry temporarily deserted by its human brood. The artist presents another, equally suggestive, aspect of arrested progress in his sketch of a ship on the ways, titled "In For Repairs."

Carnival Spirit

Donald Anderson's "County Fair" catches the whoopla spirit of carefree America on its rounds of carnival amusements. To this sketch the eye comes back again and again to catch the delicate color tones and the thrill of its action. An entirely different note is struck by Carlos Dyer's "Prairie Junction," one of the industrial type pictures, which include the interesting "Home of the Iron Horses," by Henri de Kruijff and "The River Bed" by John W. Wardham.

"The Shrine of St. Francis" by de Kruijff is perhaps the most beautiful sketch in the collection, for its spiritual values, intricate detail and lovely coloring.

The collection will be on view at the library for another ten days, or possibly longer, and the public is cordially invited to look them over.
