L. A. County Fair

Offers Eleven Hundred Prizes to Women in Home Economics

How important a part women will play in the 15th Los Angeles county fair at Pomona, Sept. 13 to Oct. 4, is revealed in the announcement by Mrs. D. C. Arbuthnot, superintendent of the household arts department, that they will have over 1,100 opportunities to win honor and cash awards in the big exposition.

The list of classifications this year is, by far, the largest in the history of the fair and embraces practically every phase of feminine endeavor in the home.

Thousands of additional feet of floor space have been arranged to house the countless exhibits which are pouring in from all parts of the United States. A veritable feast will await the interested visitors of this department.

There are 579 different classifications in the needlework division alone. These are grouped under eight main divisions including embroidery, lace work, crochet and knitting, bedspreads, quilts and afghans, rugs, pillows and bags. All kinds of baked articles, canned fruits, canned vegetables, jellies, jams and candied fruits are listed among the 200 different items in the culinary division.

An innovation that has already attracted wide attention is the department of antiques and unusual hobbies of women. Rules specify that an article to be eligible for entry in the antique department must be at least 75 years old. Listed for

awards are linens, coverlets, quilts, pantalettes, dolls, tides, samplers, candle moulds, jewelry, fans, brasses, shawls, pewter, etc. Hobbies include button collections, dolls, autograph collections, etc.

Assisting Mrs. Arbuthnot will be between 40 and 50 well-known club and society women selected because of their particular knowledge of one or the other of the classifications.
