"The oil boom made us; and the earthquake practically broke us." Mrs. Bertha B. Isbell sat smiling in a chair in her cleaning and sewing shop at 1212 El Prado.

"In 1906 we came to California from Michigan and took over a boarding house in Santa Fe Springs. During the oil boom we sold out for a nice profit. Two months afterwards it was burned to the ground.

County Activities

Postponement of the hearing originally called for Thursday of this week for morticians to air their complaints against the management of the coroner's office was announced this week by Clifford N. Amsden, director of the county efficiency bureau. Alleged favoritism in the disposition of bodies from the county morgue is to constitute part of the probe, according to Amsden.

The director said he expected to be able to announce a definite date for the hearing within the next few days. C. Hal Reynolds, of Pasadena, president of the Funeral Directors' Association of Los Angeles and Southern California, is to present the evidence against the morgue service.

Whether the board of supervisors will grant a hearing to E. D. Martindale and three other attorneys who filed the original taxpayers recovery suit on behalf of the flood control district against the contractors on the ill-fated San Gabriel high dam is expected to be decided this week.

The supervisors recently denied the claim of the attorneys for \$110,000 for legal services, and the request for a hearing before the supervisors. It was understood that a hearing was being sought before bringing a civil action against the county, in an attempt to recover thru the courts.

The Los Angeles elementary school district will receive \$9,462,081 from the state during 1936-37 for the operation of the district, according to the school budget on file today with the board of supervisors.

State contribution toward the cost of operating the Los Angeles high school district will be \$6,253,929, according to the high school district budget. The junior college district will receive \$410,510, making a total of \$16,127,030 for the three Los Angeles districts.

Revenue derived from the state sales tax provides the state's share of the contribution toward the cost of operating the schools. Previous to enactment of the Riley-Stewart tax bill by the state legislature, an ad valorem tax was levied.

Total budgeted expenditures for the Los Angeles elementary district are given as \$17,676,235, while the total budgeted expenditures for the high school district are shown to be \$16,910,595. The junior college district has expenditures of \$1,183,179 budgeted, a total of \$35,770,009 for the three districts. This includes reserves.

What the average taxpayer is most interested in, however, is the amount to be raised by taxes this year. The Los Angeles elementary district will require \$5,980,619 to be raised by taxes, the high school district will require \$6,822,842, and the junior college district will require \$512,684 to be raised by taxes.

Practically every school district has some funds left over from the previous year, in the form of reserves, and also a cash balance.

Los Angeles city councilmen will grant no permits for drilling oil on city property until a public hearing has been held to determine the effect of the drilling operations on adjoining private property, the city fathers decided this week.

The policy was laid down after considerable discussion on the proposed lease that would permit Joe Petrelli to drill for oil on city property at Jefferson and Centinella boulevards.

Councilmen decided that the public hearing could be held either before an "appropriate committee," or before the entire council.

Health Hints Offered for School Days

Empire State Medical Group Extends Aid to All Family Members

ALBANY, N. Y. (U.P.)—The Medical Society of New York state is gathering health information from throughout the country to benefit millions during fall and winter months when the common cold is prevalent.

The society inaugurated the system last year of releasing weekly health bulletins to newspapers throughout the state. The program will be continued again this year, with the campaign directed principally against the common cold—the forerunner to pneumonia.

Contributions come from state medical societies and physician members of county medical societies in the Empire state.

The society's advice ranges from treatment of a mosquito bite to preparing children for school.

School Preparation Urged
"With the advent of school next month," the society advises, "children should be made ready for school in more ways than clothes and books. They should hear well to know what the teacher says and see well what she writes on the blackboard."

In bulletins to mothers, the society advises that:
Fats are important in the diet of children as cold weather approaches.

It's not bad for children to eat between meals depending first on the child and on the food, and second if it does not interfere with the child's appetite for the next meal; light lunches of fruit, fruit juices, whole wheat bread or prepared cereals are suggested.

Mothers who overfeed their babies to see them gain weight may also see them get eczema.

Learning to swim should be part of the education of every child on reaching the age of 6.

Appetite Codding Disapproved
Too much catering to a child's appetite is incorrect; refusal to eat should be met by termination of the meal; variety is unnecessary and undesirable.

To the father, the society says:
Don't attempt to keep pace with young sons in outdoor activities.

And eyeing the family purse, the society says:
"There is just as much nutrition in the cheapest cuts of meat as in the most expensive ones. Making pennies count in the food budget requires real common sense planning."

"Mataroni and cheese is inexpensive and yet almost as nourishing as meat.

"Fish once a week improves the food balance and reduces costs.

"Milk is the almost perfect food, no greater value can be found."

Advice to Motorists
To the motorists, the society cautions against carbon monoxide poisoning.

Concerning coffee, it says the liquid affects the central nervous system and is harmful or not, depending on the amount consumed and the nature of the drinker.

The society warns against "fake" tuberculosis cures, asserting there is "no cure for tuberculosis but the slow, proved regimen of fresh air, nourishing food and sunshine."

Also, says another bulletin, "there is no truly 'acid' condition of the body." It is always alkaline. "Acidosis" is merely reduced alkalinity."
