Miss Chase spent a month of her summer vacation in this fascinating country. She made her headquarters in Mexico City, from where she made many side trips to villages in the interior, and gained a great deal of insight into the character of the inhabitants, their customs and ways of living.

Her talk was punctuated by references to the numerous souvenirs of her trip which she had on display and which brought the scenes and incidents of her visit realistically home to the listeners.

Trip Not Expensive

The primitive side of Mexican life, in the manners, customs and dress of the Indian population, the more modern but commonplace modes of the middle classes, and the sheltered life of the wealthy Spanish aristocratic women all fell under Miss Chase's discerning eye, and her story of her impressions was full of humor and local color.

Under the present rate of exchange in Mexico, a trip to that beautiful and intriguing country is not expensive, and the pattern of life as it is lived there appeals to most travelers who seek the unusual.


