Reflector Buttons Signify Curves

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.)—Have you seen those little eyes gleaming at you from the center of the pavement on certain sharp curves—eyes that spring into view suddenly, as though someone in the darkness to one side pressed a switch and illuminated a string of lights placed along the center stripe of the pavement? They are reflectorized pavement buttons with which the California state division of highways is experimenting in the interest of promoting safety for night drivers. As a car approaches, the buttons pick up and return the gleam of headlights, thus forming a string of tiny, brilliant lights which outline the center of the curving highway.

Before adopting them as permanent features of highway marking equipment, engineers will conduct exhaustive tests to determine the most effective locations and spacing, whether the buttons will be efficient in wet and foggy weather, or if daily maintenance will be necessary to assure a bright gleam.

County Activities

The area of Los Angeles county is exactly 4083.21 square miles, according to computations just completed by the United States geological survey, and filed this week with Alfred Jones, county surveyor.

Previously, the county's area has been given as between 4009 and 4115 square miles. The exact computations were worked out by the federal government in co-operation with the county surveyor. The computations were adopted this week by the board of supervisors and now are official.

Area of the mainland is 3921.95 square miles, while Santa Catalina has 74.82 miles and San Clemente Island 86.41 square miles. Elevations in the county vary from sea level to more than 10,000 feet on top of Mount San Antonio, or "Old Baldy."

Now 175 feet above bed rock at one point, San Gabriel Dam No. 1 is beginning to take shape rapidly seven miles north of Azusa, according to flood control district engineers.

The 4,000,000-yard mark was passed late last Thursday in building the 1100-foot-thick earth and rock fill dam across the canyon to hold back the flood waters of the east as well as the lower part of the west fork of the San Gabriel river. The 4,089,124 cubic yards of material placed in the dam up to September 24 represents 37.4 percent of the total content, engineers said.

Floding of materials in the 175-foot level is well under way this week. Earth and rock, some of the six grades hauled from a borrow pit in Persinger Flats several miles away, is placed in 25-foot lifts. Only three of these are above stream bed, however, the lowest point of the huge dam being 100 feet below the original stream bed.

Preparations were being completed this week for the exhibit of the handiwork of the several WPA projects sponsored by the county recreation department, to be held in Patriotic Hall from October 3 to 10, according to James Reid, superintendent.

Programs will be presented by various districts each day. The Azusa-Covina-San Gabriel district will give the program on October 3 and the afternoon of October 9. The Clearwater, Downey, Norwalk, Pico and South Whittier group is billed for October 6 and 7. The Torrance-Waltheria area is to give the program on the evening of October 5 and on the last day.

Groups from Claremont, La Verne, Bell Gardens, Huntington Park, and San Dimas are to entertain on October 8 and the evening of October 9.

Admission is free and the exhibit includes knitting, leathercraft, wall hangings, hobbies, collections, paper and woodcraft.

FRIED FISH DIVIDED TO SETTLE ARGUMENT

EMPLOYEES' SHARE OF STEEL DOLLAR INCREASES 50%



The share of each dollar received from the sale of the steel industry's products which goes to employees in the form of wages has increased by more than 50 per cent since 1900, the American Iron and Steel Institute has calculated.

For each dollar's worth of products sold last year the employees of the industry received 41 cents, while 35 years ago only 27 cents out of each dollar of sales went into payrolls.

During the same period the proportion of the industry's sales income collected in taxes by federal, state and local governments increased about 800 per cent, from half a cent out of each sales dollar to 4 1/2 cents.

These increases in the share of the industry's income going to employees

and to tax-collecting agencies were made possible by reductions in the amount paid to stockholders of the industry and by improvements in operating efficiency.

At the beginning of the period the stockholders of the industry in return for the use of their funds received 12 1/2 cents out of each dollar of sales, but in 1935 they received only 1 1/2 cents.

Meanwhile operating costs other than payrolls and taxes were being reduced from 60 to 53 cents out of each dollar in sales.

In 1935, when the average annual earnings of steel employees were the highest of any year on record, payrolls took 35 cents out of each steel dollar, a percentage which has been exceeded in each succeeding year.

Probation Plea Is Granted

Two years' probation was ordered for Forrest McKinley and Donald Kodate when they appeared in Los Angeles superior court Wednesday afternoon for disposition of the charges filed against them, involving an automobile driven without the consent of the owner.

Each was first sentenced to serve nine months in the county jail, which was suspended, and probation granted, but a \$100 fine was levied upon each defendant.

In lieu of the jail sentence. Eighteen months time was allowed each for payment of the fine through the county probation department.

Neither of the boys will be permitted to drive an automobile during their two-year probation period and they also are forbidden to use intoxicating liquor.
