Admiral Grayson Urges Everyone Join Red Cross

Mrs. Flora McDonald Says Torrance Quota of Members Is 436

Mrs. Flora McDonald, chairman of Torrance chapter, is in receipt of an appeal from Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman of the American Red Cross, Washington, D. C., in which he asks help in reaching every man and woman in every community with a personal invitation to join the Red Cross from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving, Nov. 11-28. The slogan is "The People's Red Cross." At least five million adult members are needed nationally to carry on a wide range of humanitarian service to the American people, he says: "The local branch's quota toward the five million objective is 436 members." Accomplishments of the past year and unmet needs requiring further financial support are set forth by Mrs. McDonald as follows:

The American Red Cross gave assistance to 131,000 families numbering 550,000 persons, as a result of 150 disasters. Since the Red Cross began relief 55 years ago it has served on 1,900 disaster scenes and expended more than \$109,500,000 in this work of mercy. Red Cross workers dealt with problems of 41,315 men in the army, navy, marine corps and coast guard. Two hundred and twenty-two thousand persons were given instruction in first aid. Since 1910, 1,173,494 persons have been given first aid instruction. Red Cross life saving service enrolled 80,961 life savers after instruction. Enrollees since 1914 number 715,203. Life-saving methods have materially reduced the annual toll of drownings. More support to spread this knowledge is necessary.

"Tigers" At Top Of Football's Odd Menagerie

"Bulldogs" Second, Followed By "Wildcats" and "Panthers"

NEW ORLEANS, (U.P.)—No wonder they have a song "Hold That Tiger"—it's the most popular football animal extant. Of the 516 colleges and universities in the United States boasting gridiron teams, 25 have nicknamed their squads "Tigers."

A further peek into the nicknames of squads over the nation reveals a strange menagerie. There are 28 Bulldogs, 13 Wildcats, 10 Panthers, nine Beavers, seven Bears, six Bobcats, six Lions, six Bisons, five Beavers, and a gang of other animals, including Razorbacks, Terriers, Tomcats, Polar Bears, Bulls, Vucines, Antelopes, Catamounts and Gorillas.

The monickers outside the animal class are headed by Indians, with 13 teams so named. They are followed by 10 Yellow Jackets, seven Pioneers, seven Vikings, six Spartans, five Aggies, and many others, among them the rather dubious football names of Neovianians, Covenanters, Saints, Student Princes, Christians, Druids, Mound Builders, Profs, Jimmies, Lords, Bishops, Deacons, Ichabods and Quakers.

Insects Well Represented Among the insects, are Wasps, Hornets, Goldbugs, Bees and Spiders. Taking the air, there are Eagles, Falcons, Bluejays, Hawks, Ravens, Owls, Ducks, Gulls and Sagehens. There is even a Peacock.

One of the smallest schools calls its eleven the Thundering Herd. One of the larger New York University, delicately terms its warriors the Violets.

The robust trades, where men are men, also furnished not a few football names. Take the Boltermakers, Loggers, Rivermen, Rough Riders, Matadors, Cowboys, Explorers, Rallsplitters, Mound Builders, Foresters, Orediggers and Lumberjacks.

Hurricanes and Tornadoes Then, meteorologically speaking, there are Hurricanes, Golden Hurricanes, Tornadoes, Comets and Cyclones.

Seeking doubtless to cow their opponents with fearless appellations are the Blue Devils, Gladiators, Cavemen, Knights, Tartars, Titans, Demons, Golden Avalanche, Crusaders, Pirates, Vandals, Leathernecks, Warriors, Golden Flashes, Blue Bombers, Red Dragons, Savages, Buccaneers and Flying Dutchmen.

There are not a few with a rather horsey flavor, such as Broncos, Mustangs, Plainsmen and Rangers. More dignity is attached to the Colonels, Presidents, Generals, Commodores, Dukes, Colonials and Senators.

Rustle Names Also Then there are rustic Hill Billies, Hoosiers, Plowboys and

Shockers; aboriginal Utes, Sioux, Iroquois, Siwash, Hurons, Bucks, Braves, Choctaws, Scalpers and Aztecs.

Almost every school has at least one unofficial nickname in addition to the one in the book. Some have several.

Strangely enough, however, some of the most powerful, cunning and ferocious animals are neglected. There are only two Leopards, two Grizzlies, one Mountain Lion, and no Elephants, Hippopotami or Camels.

Other lapses are Lightning, the meteorological division; Foodie in the dog section; Ants in the insect group, and Buzzards among the birds.

These few oversights, however, will leave at least some choice to any new schools that may be opening.

The state of California takes its place as one of the largest commercial fishing centers of the world with approximately 5,400 men engaged in commercial fishing, 2,500 licensed fishing boats and approximately 7,000 workers engaged in the fish canneries.

San Pedro Leads During the first six months of 1936, 38,287 tons of fresh fish were landed at California ports. Of this amount 39,311,025 pounds were landed at San Pedro; San Diego was close behind with 37,222,761 pounds; while 40,840 pounds were landed at Monterey.

Yellowfin tuna led the list with 38,544,096 pounds taken; mackerel with 17,752,187 pounds was next; bluefin tuna was next with 9,934,873 pounds; 5,634,516 pounds of striped tuna or skipjack were landed. The commercial take of yellowtail was 2,906,701 pounds. San Pedro was the only port to report landings of albacore which totalled 939,642 pounds.

College of Pacific Team Will Be Seen Against Lions Here

Two of the foremost exponents of the "razzle-dazzle" style of football play, Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg and Coach Tom Lieb, send their respective elevens, the College of Pacific and Loyola University Lions, against each other next Friday night, Oct. 23, at Gilmore stadium.

When Coach Stagg brings his College of Pacific eleven into Los Angeles to battle the Loyola Lions, fans will be watching two teams well versed in the "razzle-dazzle" football formation.

Coach Stagg has two of the finest linemen on the coast in Neehini, the center, and Johnson, the guard. In the backfield, the Pacific Tigers boast two of the niftiest punters in the West. They are Coe, half-back; and Cortez, fiery Spanish fullback. Both get off kicks of 60 and 60 yards average.

Friday's game will mark the final night game of the season for Loyola. Their games with U. S. Marines, Santa Clara University and the University of San Francisco are on Sunday afternoons with the Texas Tech classic scheduled for Wednesday afternoon on Armistice Day in the coliseum.
