Former Bosses of Marine League Average Three Touchdowns in 57 Games; Champions Four Times, Tied Three, in Past Ten Years

Annual Narbonne-Torrance Beef Tomorrow Afternoon
Yea Man, tomorrow afternoon, on the Torrance high school gridiron, the Narbonne Gauchos will fight it out with the Torrance Tartars. This game will be the 11th time these two great



Coach Ben Comrada's Narbonne Gauchos who will take the field tomorrow against the Torrance Tartars have without doubt the greatest record of achievement in either the Marine or Pacific League. The Gauchos have won two games this season and are pointing to bring the championship back to the halls of Narbonne where it rested for so many years.

Back in 1926 when the Marine and Pacific League were one, the Gauchos won four games for a total score of 84 points to none scored by opponents, to take the championship.

In 1927 they repeated, scoring 172 points to opponents' 13 of which Torrance scored 7, Bell 6. In two years they won ten games and were champs twice.

In 1928 they ranked fourth in the league, losing to Bell and Gardena, but scored 174 points, to opponents' 34.

The year 1929 they lost to Gardena. Gaucho score 162, opponents' 39. Champions.

In 1930 they fell to third place, beaten by Jacob Ritis, tied by Jordan, scored only 94 points to opponents' 30.

In 1931 they tied for the championship with Jordan, winning five, losing one, and scored 133 to opponents' 20, of which Torrance contributed 8.

In 1932 they were undisputed champs, winning all games and scoring 129 points, opponents' 19. In 1933 the Gauchos repeated, taking six games for a total score of 144, opponents' 12. After taking 15 straight games in league play, the Gauchos tripped over Gardena in the first game of the 1934 season, defeated El Segundo 27-0, tied Leuzinger 13-13 and lost to Torrance for the first time in the history of the two schools, 13-0.

Their total score for this year was only 40, opponents 39. Last year they defeated Gardena 19-0, El Segundo 21-4, Leuzinger 27-0 and tied Torrance 12-12 to be hailed as co-champs with their nearest rivals. Total score 89, opponents 12.

In the ten years since 1928 Narbonne has held the league championship four times, tied three times, and tied for second once. They have scored a total of 1,201 points to opponents' 218, or an average of 21. three touchdowns and three conversions to the game. This does not include practice games, the scores of opponents outside the regular school league, nor games already played this season.

Starting line-up for tomorrow's game will probably be Hansen, left end; T. Cook, left tackle; R. Cook, left guard; Moore, center; C. Likens, right guard; Savant, right tackle; Powell, right end; Woods, quarterback; Haslam, left halfback; Alonge, fullback; Clayton, right halfback.

Big Game Tomorrow

Annual Clash Between Torrance and Narbonne Will Be Played At Torrance

People with weak hearts and hardening of the arteries should stay away from the Narbonne-Torrance football game tomorrow on Woods Field, for this annual clash between the rival schools will be a honey. Provided that Torrance is wise to the Narbonne strategy which is full of speed and deception mixed with power plays and top kicking.

The Gauchos ran wild over the luckless youths from Leuzinger last Friday, stopping them cold with a 45-0 score. On the previous Friday they swarmed all over El Segundo and rolled up another impressive score.

Leuzinger did not even have a chance against the flea-flicker plays that flashed over the gridiron at Griffin Field last Friday and were lucky to get off without losing their shirts. No less than seven touchdowns were made with three points added, and one pass over the goal line went for no score because the receiver had one foot outside of the end zone.

With the ball tossed from hand to hand, going to at least four receivers during the course of a play, the Leuzinger boys were completely bewildered. Narbonne's aerial circus is something to watch and unless the Tartar lads can break it up when it starts there will be trouble for the red and gray in large gobs.

If the Gauchos can get by Torrance tomorrow they will be headed for another championship. They will take San Pedro and Gardena in their stride and finish undefeated this year unless the Tartars can stop them. If the Tartars take tomorrow's game, Torrance has a good chance to tie for the championship again with Narbonne as was the case last year. Their defeat by Leuzinger in the Marine League opener was unfortunate, and probably due to over-confidence as that game was believed to be in the bag.

With their self-respect restored by their win over San Pedro, which team has been feared as the dark unknown quantity since its entry into the Marine League this year, the Tartars are primed to give Narbonne the battle of the season. Just how good they are will be demonstrated by this game, and they have got to be good if they expect to win tomorrow.

Extra bleachers have been moved on to the field, there will be a public address system to announce the plays, and the football fans of Torrance are expected out in large numbers. Game will be called promptly at 3 o'clock, as all games in the city schools must be concluded by sundown or they are called on account of darkness.

A small admission fee will be charged.




