## Wise Council Needed

To Aid Misunderstood Child Says Elson

"Know the child and solve the problem of his security in later life." Very early most children determine what they wish to do when they grow up. They are eager to enter school, to be associated with individuals their own age and to have their own books. Why is it that after a few years some of them, mostly boys, take such a decided dislike for school? They play truant, make themselves and those who love them so unhappy.

In explaining this situation at a meeting of the high school Parent Teachers Association in the school music room, Monday, Mr. Thos. H. Elson, principal of the school, said in part: "Parents should study the child at home. Strive to learn the cause of his discontent, get a mental picture of him as he is. The teacher has a chance to study the pupils, when they are in study hall, among their companions and at play. She, perhaps more than anyone, with the co-operation of the parents can assist in solving the problem. For this reason the Parent Teachers Association is organized."

**Happy Youth**  
This association was organized for the one purpose, that which makes for happy youth and successful adult life. Parents are invited to come to these meetings, meet the teachers and discuss problems concerning their children. Through close co-operation many a so-called problem youth may find his or her place in later life. Mr. Elson explained that few adults have achieved that childhood aim, but stated that parents sometimes make sad mistakes by urging children to study subjects the child does not care for in order to gratify their selfish desires.

## Tulips Offer Opportunity For Perfect Color Harmony

Light Toned Varieties Best In The Distance, Brighter Colors Show Up Best In Foreground

Tulips like anything else must be given the proper setting or background in order to look



their best. The gardener should think of them as possessing personality and individuality. Some flowers can stand severe contrasts and haphazard association with other flowers, but these are the sturdier types, more or less neutral in color.

Generally speaking, tulip varieties of delicate coloring and structure should not be arranged in close proximity to those of brilliant, emphatic coloring and sturdy structure.

Far better to select a few harmonious sorts of tulips than to risk the uncertainty of any but a planned mixture.

In any very large group, a few flowers of opposite coloring, or flowers perhaps much darker or lighter in value, should be sprinkled about for accent in order to liven the scheme. One must not overdo this with the result that no particular effect or color is noticeably dominant.

The light blue and blue-violet sorts, and also those commonly called white, seem to stand back in the distance; while those of red-orange, orange, yellow, and even some shades of red-violet, if they are light in value, seem to come forward—they force themselves toward the observer.

If this fact is kept in mind, a garden may often be made to appear much more or less expansive as desired.

Examples of interesting combinations may be found in contemplating the beautiful effect produced by planting the breeders, Bronze Queen and Louis XIV side by side. Dom Pedro produces a wonderful effect as
