## Buffet Service Said Simplest

Serving food buffet style is the simplest way to serve guests, particularly if there is no extra help in the kitchen or if there are more guests than can conveniently sit down at one table, which is often the case in modern apartments. Even the buffet style is easy serving, there is something thrilling about it, too, as the table always looks so spectacular with foods arranged in big bowls, on large platters, or in favorite gadget dishes.

Selecting the food is often the big question, but for the next affair try a platter of mixed cold meats of the following varieties: Pickled pigs feet, Vienna sausages, devilled ham and lamb's tongues. This combination may be the foundation for a modified German supper. Each of these meats comes all cooked in cans and they are ever so easy to use. Chill the cans before serving time, open them and slice the meat into thin slices and then arrange them attractively on a platter and garnish it with ripe olives, mustard pickles or small onion pickles.

A bowl of potato salad or cole slaw would blend well with these meats, and the red cabbage would be particularly effective and decorative. For the hot dish, why not a casserole of steaming hot sauerkraut? For a true German touch add a few caraway seeds to the sauerkraut when it is removed from the can and arranged in the casserole. They add such a subtle flavor. After all of this, the dessert should be something like Peach Betty, baked custard with whole canned apricots around it, or just plain chilled canned plums.

## Fern School Plans 'Silver Book' Tea


