

Gardena Street Job Supervised by Summers

Construction of a large culvert with an 80-foot roadway to replace the old, narrow wooden bridge on 147th street near Western avenue has been started by James McComas, Hollywood contractor, for the city of Gardena, with Herbert J. Summers, former assistant city engineer of Torrance, supervising the work. It was learned yesterday.

This project, costing approximately \$10,000, includes a quarter-mile of paving from Western to Denker avenue, the total expense to come from state gasoline tax allocations to Gardena. One Hundred Seventy-Fourth street in the Torrance territory was resurfaced from Hawthorne boulevard to Western in 1934.

Summers designed the job for City Engineer Harold Barnett of Gardena. The former Torrance engineer was in the city's employ for seven years. He is now in business for himself in Pasadena. The electrical engineering work on the new lined oil refinery of Spencer Kellogg and Sons, largest manufacturers of that product in the U. S., in Long Beach, is one of his projects. When completed in the next few months, this will be a million-dollar investment in the beach city.

Co. Street Work Near City Okayed

Two improvement projects to be undertaken by the county near Torrance were okayed by the city council Tuesday night. These were: for the grading, repaving and installation of a better drainage system at the intersection of 190th street and Western avenue; and for the grading, widening and paving of Torrance boulevard in county territory, the total cost of the two works being \$4,050.



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Steel Prices Rise With Pay Boosts

Increase in the price of steel will follow the recent increase in the wages paid to steel workers, it was disclosed this week by the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation, subsidiary of the United States Steel subsidiary. It was understood that other steel companies would follow suit with a similar announcement shortly.

The U. S. Steel subsidiary announced that an advance of \$2 a ton would be made, effective Dec. 1, on re-rolling semi-finished materials, including sheet bars, \$30 per ton on carbon bars, shapes and plates, and \$4 per ton on strip, tin mill black plate and sheets. Standard rails are increased from \$36.37 to \$49 per gross ton for rails above 60 pounds per lineal yard. Advances on other products will be proportionate, the announcement stated. Advance in price on vitriol is to be advanced \$3 a ton.

11 Million Gain Noted In State Revenues

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 26 (U.P.)—Revenue from state taxes brought in a total of \$44,000,000 during the last four months as compared with \$33,000,000 during the same period of 1935, State Controller Ray L. Riley reported.

In addition to this \$11,000,000 increase, Riley reported that an additional \$2,500,000 was derived from non-revenue cash receipts. A total of \$46,798,415 was received from July 1 to Oct. 31, inclusive. Retail sales taxes during the same period brought in more than \$26,000,000, while personal income tax receipts amounted to almost \$15,000,000, an increase of \$1,100,000, Riley reported. Liquor licenses added up to \$2,300,000, a \$1,000,000 raise, while liquor stamp receipts were \$2,450,000, an increase of more than \$500,000.

POSTPONE MEETING The regular monthly meeting of the Torrance Coordinating Council, scheduled for last Monday, was indefinitely postponed.

Fire Chief Urges Escapes, Relays

Fire Chief A. D. Stevenson wants all three-story buildings in Torrance equipped with fire escapes. In a letter to the city council Tuesday night he also desired an arrangement with the Redondo Beach telephone exchange whereby fire calls coming into the Wateria substation be relayed to the central station by the operator.

Torrance has an ordinance requiring fire escapes on all two-story buildings constructed in the future but it is not retroactive, City Attorney C. T. Rippey reported. Mayor Stanger suggested that City Engineer Frank Leonard see the owners of three-story structures here to find out if they will voluntarily co-operate in this matter of safety.

Be Sure Yule Cards Have Right Address

Mallers of Christmas cards were warned today by Postmaster Earl Comer that if they use one and one-half cent postage stamps on their card envelopes, the address must be correct because such reduced postage mail cannot be returned to sender.

"If you are not certain of a friend's address, be sure and use regular first class postage, two cents for local or Torrance mail, three cents for outside," Comer said.

Lomitas Form 'Sing' Saturday

All residents of Lomitas and vicinity interested in informal community singing are cordially invited to attend the first "sing" that will be held in the V. F. W. hall, Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock.

Those planning to attend should bring whatever song books they possess, especially those containing Christmas carols, as these will be stressed during the regular meetings to follow thru the holiday season.

Abramson to Open Branch on El Prado

Harry Abramson of the National Home Appliance Company at 1318 Sartori avenue, announced today that he is enlarging his firm and will open a branch at 1228 El Prado where N. A. Collins, who has operated the Radio Service store at 1209 1/2 El Prado for the last six months, will be in charge.

The branch will be the radio and used appliances division of Abramson's progressive firm. It will probably be ready for opening Monday. Collins is an expert radio technician and has been in that business since 1922. In addition to this service to Torrance residents, Abramson will also display used radios, gas ranges and washing machines at attractive prices in his branch on El Prado.

Insurance Protest Filed By Council

Although they cited several reasons why B. C. Buxton should not be granted the insurance on the city fleet and asked that the action be reconsidered, Howard G. Locke and W. H. Gilbert's letter to the city council Tuesday night failed to change the city board's decision awarding Buxton the insurance business.

Councilman William H. Tolson said that his inquiries into the matter proved "that so far as the city is concerned we are within our rights." The communication was filed.

First Symphony Concert Dec. 4

Program is Announced for Auditorium Event

First of a program of six symphony concerts in the civic auditorium will be presented Friday night, Dec. 4, by the recently-formed Torrance Symphony and Grand Opera Association, according to George Mershon, conductor.

Present plans call for concerts on the last Friday of each month from January to May following the inaugural program. One complete symphony and one standard overture will feature each concert and there will be guest soloists.

For its first program, the orchestra will play Schubert's unfinished Symphony, V. F. Seaver's Don Quixote's suite complete in four parts, Louis Ganne's La Carmine, L. P. Laurondeau's Apollo overture, and Caribbean Sea, a fox trot by Kahn-Marsh. A string ensemble will present two numbers by Walter A. Quincke and Scott R. Ludlow, former mayor and present city treasurer, is scheduled to make a short address.

Belmont Battles Gaucho In Big Grid Carnival

Warren Haslam, Narbonne's outstanding candidate for prep grid honors, made a formidable showing before some 65,000 fans who attended the fourth annual P. T. A. football carnival in the Los Angeles Coliseum Wednesday afternoon, but failed to bring his Narbonne eleven into the victory column.

The Gaucho star had little chance to display his field ability because Belmont kept Narbonne tied up tight and won from the Lomitas, 14-0. Haslam showed plenty of passing ability. A summary of the period battles shows that the Southern team met their fourth straight defeat at the hands of Northern high school squads, 88 to 14.

Coach Conrider, while he gave the huge crowd a good look at his first string, was obviously not taking any chances on injuries which might cripple his team for the semi-final title game with Los Angeles high on Dec. 4. Belmont's first score came when one of Haslam's passes was intercepted. The Hilltoppers scored once more on a pass just before the period ended and both conversions were good.

Plans for Narbonne Work Under Way

Plans are being drafted by City Engineer Frank R. Leonard's staff for the widening and improvement of the west side of Narbonne avenue from Sepulveda to the city limits. The work will also include the installation of a sidewalk on that side of the thoroughfare.

Leonard said yesterday that work will not start on this project, launched by the city council a week ago, until after the first of the year. More widening work is necessary before the job can begin and the power line must be moved back from the right-of-way.

County Purchasing Agent Urged by Leland Ford

Appointment of a Los Angeles county resident to the position of county purchasing agent will be urged by Supervisor Leland M. Ford of the fourth district, the Santa Monica supervisor said today.

Action on the appointment was deferred by Chairman Roger W. Jessup after an eligible list of three names had been announced late last week, in order that all five members of the board might be present when the new man was selected.

In the interim, James M. McCool, an assistant purchasing agent, was named acting county purchasing agent. W. R. Cortright, chief assistant, whose 60-day appointment expired last Friday, did not pass the examination given by the county civil service commission, and could not hold the position by temporary appointment longer than 60 days.

Wayne R. Allen, of Oakland, will be the county's new purchasing agent, effective Dec. 1, having been selected Tuesday by the board of supervisors. He was the highest ranking among three candidates.
