

Concert Will Star Morini

Erica Morini, greatest woman violinist with Philharmonic orchestra in the fifth pair of concerts, Feb. 4-5, Otto Klemperer conducting, will be heard playing the great Peter Tchaikovsky concerto for violin and orchestra, opus 35.

At the present time the great Russian composed this very melodious but tremendously difficult concerto he dedicated it to Leopold Auer the grand old man, as he came to be known before his death a few years ago—who was the teacher of most of the world's famous violin virtuosos.

Of such technical ability and virtuosity is Morini made that this most stupendous concerto of all time for the violin is one of her regular repertoire numbers. Otto Klemperer will conduct Brahms' Tragic Overture, Richard Strauss' Der Burgher als Edelman or as the French have it, "Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme", and Wagner's Bachanale from Tannhauser.

Universal Language

Help in Establishing Peace Among Nations

In Speaking before the Elementary Parent Teachers Association in the school auditorium Tuesday afternoon, Mrs. Luise Kilbright urged parents to attend adult education classes and to study Esperanto, an artificial language designed to be universal. Esperanto was devised by Dr. Zamenhof, a Russian, who accepted as his pen name Dr. Esperanto in publishing his first pamphlet regarding the language in 1887. The vocabulary is based as far as possible on words common to the chief European languages and sounds peculiar to any one language are eliminated. The spelling is phonetic and the accent is always on the last syllable.

A universal language would be of great help in establishing world peace. At present there are, Mrs. Kilbright stated, 3500 different languages which would make it very difficult to address all nations in a world wide radio hook up without a group of interpreters.
