


# Clubwomen Hear History of Torrance Water Department

**IN CITY OF THE SACRED WELL** by T. A. Willard we read the absorbing narrative of 30 years archeological work in the jungle of Yucatan. The mystery of ancient Yucatan is the greatest mystery of man on this continent, perhaps the greatest mystery of mankind's lost civilization on this globe.

**I LIKE DIVING** by Thomas Eadie: This author got the Congressional Medal of Honor for his work on the S-4. He had already received the Navy Cross for many other difficult and dangerous deep sea jobs. This book is not only a thrilling narrative of under-sea adventure but it is a picture of the science of modern diving and of daring and dangerous rescue work.

**JUNGLE PORTRAITS** by Della Akeley: This is a story of experiences that no one who has a liking for animals, for adventure, or for a good tale told should miss. Della Akeley, one white woman among thirty muttonous natives, organized and carried through an expedition to rescue her husband Carl Akeley who, having been struck down by a charging elephant, was deserted wounded in the jungle. This is an experience which few have ever read it ever forget.

**PARIS (U.P.)**—A draw curtain veil reminiscent of the motion picture "Quality Street" is used by Patou on the brim of a chic black felt cone-shaped hat, one of the most outstanding novelty designs shown in the Paris winter collections. The veil is arranged so that it slides back to either side of the face and is of chin-length.

Lelong introduces a touch of the unusual in his collection also showing a hat of the '90s complete with plume and typical veil of that era. The hat is worn with a black crepe dinner dress of the same period with red and green founaces of a silk petticoat showing beneath the black skirt, pleated and draped to give the effect of a slit.

A version of the scoop-halo of the Empire period, rising from the forehead, and tilting to the back is seen in the Lanvin collection, and in contrast the same house presents a white fur pill-box hat with lacings of white kid.

Marcel Fochas shows a smart little felt with a braided pigtail hanging down the back, the end tied with velvet ribbon to match the dress of the ensemble, and Heim's outstanding presentation is his capulet hoods of fur and fabric to match daytime coats.

Besides her inverted shoe hat, Schiaparelli shows a type of artist beret of velvet, tilted forward over the eyebrow. Dashing upturned hats are Molyneux's choice for evening.

A fox tail rising high on the front of a little hat at Callot Soeurs matches fox-head pockets and silver fox trim which circles the shoulders of a black wool afternoon suit.
