PARIS, (U.P.)—Your choice of buttons may be an index to your personality during the coming winter—for they have ceased to be utilitarian fasteners following conventional designs and may be simple or elaborate, humorous or symbolic, according to the whim of the individual.

Simple, dark bone buttons that another season would be tucked away out of sight, parade up the backs of simple sports dresses. Large wooden buttons are made into flowers and animals for the blouses of soft woolsens.

Schiaparelli features wooden buttons in the form of flowers. Violins are another of her button types that serve as the only trim for severely cut frocks.

There are fur buttons for double-breasted coats and suits, and Jenny uses large gold buttons on a black afternoon dress and trims the neckline of a white evening gown with small circles of the metal.

Chanel trims a black velvet strapless evening gown with a flower design in shell-like buttons.

Double-breasted jackets fasten with large wooden buttons at many fashion houses and others show jackets buttoned to high, round necklines. Louiseboulanger uses buttons on the side-seams of a straight black wool dress with square collar and yoke edged in white.

Buttons are featured as trim on a gold wool dress worn with a grayish beige double-breasted coat trimmed in lynx at Jenny's. Mainbocher uses large gold and black ones on the front of a black broadcloth coat. Lanvin buttons back the revers of a dark green suit trimmed in light green with big gold buttons and repeats the trim on the orange blouse of the suit.

A list of modern fiction on America as interpreted by Americans has proved interesting to many libraries and friends of libraries. Several lists have been made, but one that has been chosen within certain limitations such as acuteness of observation, correct perspective, and artistic expression of the author (plus the usual criteria demanded of novels and other books of literary quality) has many titles which the Torrance public library hopes readers have not missed.

In the section devoted to southern states, do you know? **THREE HEADED ANGEL**, a collection of plantation stories by Roark Bradford; **HAPPY MOUNTAIN**, (1928) and **HOME PLACE** (1929), both by Maristhan Chapman.

The charm of these stories of Tennessee mountain people lies in character studies and the poetic language.

VEIN OF IRON (1935) by Ellen Glasgow, a fine study of Scotch-Irish folk in Virginia.

ROMANTIC COMEDIANS (1929) by Ellen Glasgow, amusing, penetrating novel of changing standards in Virginia society.

LAMB IN HIS BOSOM (1936) by Caroline Miller, a story of pioneering life in Georgia back-country pre-Civil War days written with charm and sincerity.

GONE WITH THE WIND by Margaret Mitchell—No description needed.

SCARLET SISTER MARY (1929) by Julia Peterkin, a colorful story revealing the fineness as well as the weakness and superstition of the Negro of South Carolina.

SOUTH MOON UNDER (1933) by M. K. Rawlings, a simple story of life in the Florida backwoods, in the scrub country where pioneer life still exists.

MADAME TOUSSAINT'S WEDDING DAY (1936) by Thad St. Martin, a remarkable vivid picture of a remote Cajun community on a delta of the Mississippi.

GREEN MARGINS (1936) by E. P. O'Donnell, a study of Cajun and Slavs on the Mississippi delta.

THE FORGE (1932), **THE STORE** (1932) and **THE CATHEDRAL** (1934) all by T. S. Stripling, a first hand report and study of the lower social levels of the South today.

SO RED THE ROSE (1934) by Stark Young, a slow moving tale but a massive impression of Louisiana Planters in Civil War.
