


Legion Post Defeats Auxiliary in Membership Campaign

"STARRY ADVENTURE" by Mrs. M. H. Austin: Against a glowing canvass of New Mexico is drawn a compelling portrait of bewildered and idealistic youth fumbling for a grasp on reality.

"DEATH COMES FOR THE ARCHBISHOP" by Willa Cather: The gorgeous panorama of the old Southwest passes before the eyes of a gentle French priest.

"HONEY IN THE HORN" by W. L. Davis: History and some fact combined in a story of Oregon pioneer life.

"IN THOSE DAYS" by Harvey Ferguson: The story of the Santa Fe Trail in its change—wagons—Indians—railroad and gas.

"ENCHANTED CANYON" by Mrs. H. W. Morrow: An unusual story of the Grand Canyon and Arizona desert.

"LAUGHING BOY" by Oliver LaFarge: An idyll of the Navajo country.

"WILD GESE" by Martha Ostensio: A tale of a Scandinavian avian community in the Northwest.

"BROTHERS IN THE WEST" by Robert Reynolds: The story of two brothers bound indissolubly together.

"TORTILLA FLAT" by John Steinbeck: This story of life among the child-like natives of a tumble-down back section of Monterey is distinguished for its facile style and epic humor.

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
