50,000 Jobless Register With State in Week

State department of employment officials estimated more than 50,000 jobless Californians registered for benefit payment under the Unemployment Reserves act by last Monday. That day ended the first week since the act became effective in this state when workers became eligible for payments.

One of the worst defeats ever hung on a Tartar varsity basketball team in Marine league competition was administered to the Torrance quintet last Friday by Gardena. The final score of 48 to 11 indicates the completeness of the Mohicans' victory and the rout of the Tartars. Coach Bert Merrill, who has been badly hampered all season by lack of experienced material, saw his squad almost powerless to combat the Gardena's basket-hooping drives.

Coach Merrill took some consolation out of his Class Bee's 23-22 win over the Gardena Bees in an overtime game. A foul shot as the gun barked at the end of the regular playing period gave the Tartar Bees three minutes in which to score their victory.

San Pedro continued its march toward a Marine league casaba championship the same day by trouncing the Narbonne Gauchos 22 to 16 and the Pirate Bees followed suit by winning from the Lomita Bees 41 to 28. It was the Pirate varsity's third straight victory of the season. Friday they meet Torrance in the first round at San Pedro. The Pirate Bees have won two and lost one game this season.
