


Legion Auxiliaries of Torrance and Redondo Hold Joint Initiation Here

TOWERS WITH IVY by Minnie Hite Moody: This is the story of four generations of an American family who founded a college in the wilderness. Mrs. Moody has created a panorama not unlike that of Virginia Woolf's "The Waves" and her book is a delightful mirror of the days it reflects. She has captured in her moods of reminiscence the feeling of the college of yesterday.

THE CITADEL by A. J. Cronin: "A great novel about a doctor by a doctor who is a great novelist."

In this excellently written and absorbing novel the author tells the story of a young Dr. Manson, giving a vivid portrait of an intelligent, hard-headed young physician struggling to gain a foothold in his profession. Undoubtedly Dr. Cronin has drawn on his own experiences in the study and practice of medicine. The conflict of medical honesty and competitive society form the primary theme closely interwoven with a secondary theme of married love. Dr. Cronin has achieved in this story, as in his earlier ones, a satisfying solid three dimensional quality. Andrew Manson and his career through the vicissitudes of success and failure, happiness and sorrow has both the ring of fundamental truth and the swing of great story telling.

THE RUNNING OF THE DEER by Dan Wickenden: The author has painted a very readable and engaging picture in his first novel and one that has promise of much more to follow. In a simple story of a modest middle-class life we find the unfolding of a vision through the conventional plot of the book. "Keep your excitement!" says Uncle Christopher, "no terrible thing ahead of you can matter much if you tackle it boldly."

Walter Duranty, Moscow correspondent of the New York Times since 1920, author of the widely read "I Write as I Please" which established him as one of the most expert writers on Soviet Russia, has written his first novel, "One Life One Kopek."

Into the life story of a handsome young peasant called Ivan Petrovich, the author has compressed all the force and the spirit of a world shaking revolt. Ivan's story is a violent one because it takes in violent times and it is a romantic one, too. Whether in sympathy with Revolution or not, readers will agree with John Gunther that "It is impossible to lay 'One Life One Kopek' down, unfinished."
