YOUNG HENRY NAVARRE

by Heinrich Mann: This book presents the unique spectacle of a novel written by a man in exile, composed in another country, copyrighted in another and published in a third. The book itself, gorgeous history, is testimony that nothing can disturb the talent of the author.

Henry, like Elizabeth of England, accomplished the seemingly impossible. Rulers of little kingdoms, they scotched the ruler of the world and elected to unify their people, lead them from hatred to tolerance, and from economic distress to being. In the life of Henry the author brilliantly develops the theme that power which has grown too sure inevitably becomes stupid.

Readers will recall that both Heinrich Mann and his brother Thomas were born, educated, and lived in Germany, ranking among the most talented authors of their generation. Since Hitler came to power in 1933 they have been exiled, but still of great stature politically they have become a symbol of the old Germany, the liberal progressive, modern Germany which still lives but at present out of German territory.

THEY SEEK A COUNTRY

Before the epic journey across the plains and deserts of the American pioneers, well had been another great trek, as courageous and even more picturesque. When in the 1830s the English-freed slaves in their Cape Colony of South Africa and began to enforce their laws, the independent Dutch headed their wagons into the unknown north to found their own free state in the Transvaal. This is the covered wagon legend of South Africa and it has the sure power of all pioneer tales.


The swiftly moving story involves the fortunes of a young Englishman and a Boer family with characters that live and grow against the magnificent background of untamed Africa. The New York Times Book Review says: "Francis Brett Young could well be content to rest his reputation on this magnificent book." It is without question one of the most humane, poised and finely imaginative novels ever presented.

NOTHING IS SAFE

This is a novel of two children whose world was devastated by their parent's divorce. Viewed from the point of view of Terry, aged 12, and Julia, aged 10, the summer vacation develops into a tragic sequence as they are shunted back and forth between three households: that of their father in London, who has married an "arty" young woman; their mother in the country, who is dominated by a blustering captain; and that of the grandparents who are very old-fashioned. The children, beginning to realize the difference made in their lives by the divorce and remarriages, seem much more reasonable and responsible than the careless adults who hide between half truths to defend their conscience.


For loafing are seersucker shorts topped with the briefest of brassieres, or gaily striped pique sun-suits whose extra knee-length skirts can be worn as capes. Cart-wheel peasant-straws, like coolie hats, with silver-dollar sized crowns, are worn to shade the eyes. Dark Hollywood glasses also are popular.

Southern-wear bathing suits forecast summer modes. One-piece suits knitted of silk laces are the most prevalent. These have wide cut-outs at the waist and are either halter-necked or without shoulder straps. With the latter type, invisible elastic bands are stitched at the top to keep the suit in place. A checked wool bathing suit has a new circular skirt which is detachable. Snapped to it is a lightweight utility bag, also of the checked wool, and shaped like a flap-over pocket.

Outdoor woodfire grills for chicken are a special Cannes treat. The popular dress for these are slacks, trousers or pantaloons. Slacks are of unbleached muslin or pique and are topped with brightly colored mess jackets. The linen trousers are in warm tropical hues and are ankle-tied like a Mexican poncho.

Pantaloons are the "dernier cri" and are so full they suggest a skirt. They are quite formal affairs, made of floating chiffon, lush satin or indigo jersey. One was seen with a bright red, hip-length angora coat. Most of them, however, are worn with blouses, richly embroidered or spangled.
