
District Clubwomen Will Convene Here Sept. 15

PARIS (U.P.)—Weddings still rank as the No. 1 opportunity for fashion sprees but at the same time they frequently offer a problem not always easy to solve. Paris ceremonies may give a few ideas for the bride, guest or attendant.

If the bride is young and slim, she might take her cue from the recent country wedding of Ann France Bird to Thomas Wilson, Jr. The bride wore a Mainbocher wedding gown of soft white mousseline with white silk leaves woven through it. The skirt was fully gathered and trailed behind in a short train. The bodice, almost approaching a gathered blouse, had a corsage of white mousseline flowers at its V. Its sleeves were just below the elbow, tight at the bottom, draped at the top. With the gown the bride wore long white mousseline gloves and a floor-length tulle veil caught by a circlet of artificial white spring flowers.

For her going-away outfit the young American girl chose a Mainbocher ensemble with a printed silk dress under a navy crepe-de-chine coat, featuring the popular bloused top gathered skirt. Her hat was a broad trimmed navy felt with a coarse filet net crown.

A more pretentious wedding was that of Princess Eugenie of Greece to Prince Radziwill. For the civil ceremony at the town hall, the princess wore a Molyneux gown of pale blue crepe with a matching coat. The coat, had a pleated skirt, the dress, had a draped waist, featuring two dress-material roses at its neck.

Princess Georges of Greece, the bride's mother, chose a long perneviche blue satin dress cut on slim lines and with long sleeves to wear at the church ceremony.
