Water Report Shows General Development

(Continued from Page 1) cubic feet of water last year from its two wells, which average a production of 1,308 gallons per minute each. The 1936-37 production was 43,062,700 cubic feet. July, 1937, was the peak month—4,562,000 cubic feet of water being poured thru the municipal mains. Last month's distribution amounted to 5,922,000 cubic feet. It took 654,140 kilowatts to pump the 1937-38 production as compared to 593,650 kilowatts for 1936-37. To purify the water, the department used 7,570 pounds of chlorine and 2,196 pounds of pure ammonia last year, according to Superintendent Stanger's reports which are audited quarterly by C. J. Rambo, city auditor.
