

**State Comes to Aid of County's 'Forgotten Dependent Children'**

The state of California has come to the rescue of Los Angeles county's "forgotten children."

At the insistence of the state department of social welfare County Superintendent of Charities Rex Thomson has recommended to the board of supervisors that the amount allowed dependent children be increased by 15 percent.

The state department has just completed a survey which revealed that Los Angeles county was not allowing dependent children sufficient money to conform to the standards of living in San Francisco and Alameda counties, Thomson explained to the supervisors.

The state officials asked for a 46 percent increase to bring the thousands of dependent children here up to the level with those in the Northern California area. The increase asked by the state would have cost the county an additional \$1,001,857 this fiscal year, Thomson estimated. He estimated the modified 15 percent which he has recommended will cost but an additional \$326,700 this year.

Set up in the preliminary budget as the county's share of the allowance to dependent children there now is an item of \$2,177,950. The balance of the cost is borne by the state.

**Wear-Cap-Drive Starts**  
ST. LOUIS (U.P.)—Determined to raise the status of the cap for sports and outdoor wear, manufacturers have started a campaign to revive that headgear.

Petitions asking for the incorporation of a portion of the Palos Verdes Estates as a city of the sixth class were on file today with the board of supervisors, with a request that steps be taken at once to call an election in the area.

A population of about 1,100 persons is included within the boundaries of the area it is proposed to incorporate, which would be on the most westerly projection and slope, between Malaga Cove and Lunada Bay. Included within the area is a proposed public park, which the land owners have asked the county to acquire and in payment thereof to cancel several thousand dollars in delinquent taxes against the corporation's holdings throughout the Estates.

G. A. Bauman, who filed the petitions with the supervisors, stated that the area had a total assessed valuation of \$2,557,115 for land and improvements, with the latter amounting to about one-third the value of the land.

Other names on the petition include W. Harold Kingsley, former Torrance and Long Beach newspaperman; Gordon Gilmore, W. H. Final and Arthur L. Blount. The supervisors have forwarded the petitions to Registrar of Voters W. M. Kerr for checking, and he will report back as to whether the petition is sufficient.

Next step will be for the supervisors to hold a public hearing to fix the boundaries of the district it is proposed to incorporate. Objecting property owners have the right to demand that their holdings be excluded. The election date then is set by the supervisors.

The county now has 44 incorporated cities. There were 45 until the consolidation of Tujunga with Los Angeles several years ago.



